

EAGLE LAKE POLICE REPORT

The Eagle Lake Police Department (ELPD) reported the following calls and cases for the week ending Dec. 11.

On Dec. 5, at 8:04 a.m., Officer Michael Krenek was called to 500 E. Main St. in reference to an unwanted person on the property. The suspect left the scene prior to Krenek's arrival, but was later located and issued a criminal trespass warning.

At 11:05 a.m., Officer Krenek and Sgt. Tim Crume were contacted at the ELPD in reference to an aggravated sexual assault. The victim advised the offense occurred in the county. The investigation was turned over to the Colorado County Sheriff's Department.

At 6:10 p.m., Lt. Clem Johnson and Officer Bryan Lasley responded to a juvenile entering an empty apartment at 226 Hunter's Lane. The officers arrived and located the juvenile suspect at a residence on Airline Dr. The juvenile was identified and advised to stay away from the apartments.

officers also obtained the phone number to his sister's residence, so he could call before going to visit.

At 3:42 p.m., Officer Nelson arrested Martin Ruvalcaba at 700 Gonzales St. on a warrant for motion to adjudicate guilt/burglary of a building \$10,000 bond. Ruvalcaba was processed at the ELPD then transported to the Colorado County Detention Center (CCDC) for confinement.

On Dec. 7 at 5 p.m., Sgt. Bill Lattimore arrested Rodney Eaton at 511 Eighth St. on a grand jury indictment warrant for his involvement in an aggravated assault which occurred at the Cadillac Club on Oct. 22. Eaton was processed at the ELPD then transported to the CCDC for confinement.

At 7:20 p.m., Officer Wendy Alley was contacted at the ELPD in reference to a run-away. The juvenile was located and returned home.

At 11:58 p.m., Officer Alley arrested Anthony Barrios in the 100 block of FM 3013 for driving while his license was suspended. Barrios was transported to the ELPD for processing and later to the CCDC for confinement.

On Dec. 8, at 11:36 a.m., Sgt. Crume was advised that Curtis Jermaine Glenn was transported to the CCDC for confinement, after being arrested in Ft. Bend County on two Colorado County warrants. One of the warrants was issued as a result of the ELPD's investigation of an aggravated assault which occurred at the Cadillac Club Oct. 22.

The other warrant was issued after Officer Alley conducted a traffic stop in the 1100 block of E. Main St. on Nov. 5. During the stop, Officer Alley recognized Glenn as one of the passengers in the vehicle and attempted to arrest him on the previous warrant.

Glenn then fled from the vehicle on foot. He has been charged with aggravated assault, a second-degree felony, \$50,000 bond, and evading arrest, a Class B misdemeanor.

At 6:50 p.m., Sgt. Lattimore was dispatched to 104 Boothe Dr. in reference to a disorderly conduct call. The suspect left the scene prior to Lattimore's arrival. A report was taken and charges were filed.

At 8:36 p.m., Sgt. Lattimore was dispatched to the Rice Medical Center where a patient had arrived after attempting to commit suicide. Texana Mental Health Agency was advised and a mental health screener was sent to the hospital for an evaluation.

On Dec. 9 at 3:02 p.m., Officer Randy Schlauch was dispatched to an auto-pedestrian accident in the 100 block of Warwick St. The investigation revealed that the vehicle was being driven by a juvenile male when another juvenile jumped onto the vehicle and fell. The 16-year-old juvenile was injured in the fall and was later transported to Hermann Hospital for a skull fracture. The accident is under investigation.

On Dec. 10 at 12:04 a.m., Sgt. Lattimore and Officer Alley were dispatched to a large crowd at the Cadillac Club. The officers had received information that a fight was going to take place. The officers dispersed the crowd without incident.

At 1:34 a.m., Sgt. Lattimore, Officer Alley and Colorado County Sheriff deputies were dispatched to a report of shots being fired in the 400 block of First St. The case is under investigation. A suspect has been identified.

At 2:45 p.m., Officer Lasley was advised that some juveniles were in an abandoned house at 817 Eighth St. Officer Lasley arrived and the juveniles fled on foot. Officer Lasley pursued the suspects, catching one. All four suspects have been identified. The case is under investigation and charges may be pending.

On Dec. 11, at 8:30 a.m. Officer Lasley was dispatched to a residence on E. State St. in reference to persons harassing the resident, as they would drive by his house. Lasley took the information and began searching for the described vehicle and persons.

At 6 p.m., Officer Krenek was dispatched to the Rice Medical Center in reference to a dog bite patient. Krenek later learned that the patient was a three-year-old male who had his face scratched by a chained-up pit bull at the child's residence.


