

EAGLE LAKE POLICE REPORT

The Eagle Lake Police Department (ELPD) reported the following calls and cases for the week ending Aug. 7.

July 31, at 9:45 a.m., a complainant contacted Officer Rosalinda Perez at the ELPD to report her juvenile son did not return home the night before. The juvenile was located and the case was turned over to the Juvenile Probation Department.

At 5:16 p.m., Lt. Clem Johnson responded to a burglary of a habitation at a residence in the 500 block of E. Union St.

The suspect entered the habitation through a window in the front of the house and stole a handgun.

The ELPD later recovered the firearm and detained a juvenile, charging him with burglary of a habitation, a second degree felony.

At 9 p.m., Officer Bryan Lasley was dispatched to a theft at a residence in the 400 block of Maple St. The suspect(s) apparently took an air-conditioner out of a window. The case is under investigation.

At 9:25 p.m., Officer Lasley and Lt. Johnson were dispatched to a criminal trespass at a residence in the 800 block of Sempres St. The unwanted person was issued a criminal trespass warning and instructed to leave.

Aug. 1, at 6:55 p.m., Officer Lasley responded to a disturbance in the 600 block of E. Main St. Lasley contacted the caller who stated the disturbance was verbal in nature and one of the subjects involved had left the area prior to the officer's arrival.

Aug. 2, at 5:54 p.m., Officers Lasley and Perez, Sgt. Tim Crume and Lt. Johnson responded to an auto-bicyclist accident at the intersection of Allen and East B Streets, where they found a five-year-old female lying in the street.

During the investigation, the officers learned Robert Frausto was traveling south bound in the 200 block of Allen St. in a Chevrolet pickup.

The child was riding her bicycle east bound in the 900 block of B, entered the intersection and was struck by the truck. East B has a posted sign at the intersection giving traffic on Allen the right of way. There was no indication Frausto violated any traffic laws and he was not cited.

The child was taken to Rice Medical Center (RMC) by EMS Unit Medical 3 for possible internal injuries.

Aug. 3, at 12:38 a.m., Lt. Johnson

was dispatched to the Post Office to contact a complainant who claimed she had been threatened by another individual armed with a knife. The case is under investigation.

Aug. 4, at 12:23 a.m., Sgt. Bill Lattimore was called to a disturbance at a residence in the 700 block of B Street. The caller advised the disturbance involved another subject who had already left the scene. No criminal offense had occurred.

At 3:22 a.m., Officer Steven Nelson was dispatched to a disturbance at a residence in the 300 block of South Lake Ave. Nelson arrived and learned one of the subjects involved left prior to his arrival. The caller advised Nelson no violence had occurred.

At 10:56 a.m., Officer Wendy Alley responded to a traffic accident in the 800 block of S. McCarty Ave.

Yolanda Tapia was traveling south bound in the 800 block of S. McCarty in a 1990 Ford.

David Powell was also traveling south bound in the 800 block of S. McCarty St. in a Toyota pickup.

Tapia apparently made an unsafe lane change, striking the pickup and causing minor damage to the vehicles. No injuries were reported.

At 5:07 p.m., Officer Alley conducted a traffic stop in the 1500 block of E. Main St. Sgt. Crume and Officer Arnold Terrazas arrived to assist.

Officer Alley attempted to arrest the driver of the vehicle, Kenneth Harold Peikert, for driving while intoxicated. Peikert assaulted Alley, but was quickly subdued by the three officers.

Sgt. Crume transported Peikert and Officer Alley to RMC for examinations. Officer Alley suffered a possible fractured wrist.

Peikert was released by RMC with minor injuries and charged with driving while intoxicated, a Class B misdemeanor; and assault on a public servant, a third degree felony.

Aug. 5, at 12:47 a.m., Officer Nelson conducted a traffic stop in the 800 block of E. Main St.

As a result of the stop, the driver, Martin Ferrel, was arrested for possession of cocaine under one gram, a state jail felony. The passenger, Manuel Ferrel, was arrested for public intoxication, a Class C misdemeanor.

At 2:26 p.m., Officer Perez recovered a stolen car stereo from a vehicle in the 800 block of S. McCarty St. The stereo was turned over to the Colorado

County Sheriff's Department who was conducting the investigation.

Aug. 6, at 1:42 a.m., Officer Nelson conducted a traffic stop in the 300 block of W. Waverly St.

As a result of the stop, the driver, James W. Clipson, was arrested for two outstanding DPS warrants and two outstanding Eagle Lake municipal warrants. Clipson paid the fines and was later released.

At 9:15 p.m., Sgt. Crume and Of-

ficers Nelson and Terrazas were dispatched to an aggravated assault call at a residence in the 700 block of S. McCarty.

A 16-year-old juvenile male was detained for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon/family violence, a second degree felony. The juvenile was transported to the Colorado County Boot Camp.

At 9:35 p.m., the ELPD began receiving calls of downed power lines

and trees due to the high winds and rain.

Sgt. Crume called out the Eagle Lake Volunteer Fire Department (ELVFD), the Public Works Department and CP&L to assist in the emergency calls.

Members from the four organizations were able to block streets and protect passing motorists from the debris and downed power lines.

At 9:50 p.m., Sgt. Crume received information that a residence at 208 N. McCarty was filled with smoke. The occupant of the residence was able to flee safely.

Sgt. Crume gained entry into the house through a window and opened the door for the fire department. Emer-

gency crews located the source of the smoke in a main breaker box on the outside of the house.

It was determined that a power surge from a downed power line had badly burned the breaker box, but did not cause it to burst into flames.

Thanks to the quick response from the four agencies, there were no injuries as the result of the storm.

Aug. 7, at 11:49 p.m., Officer Perez was dispatched to smoke in a building in the 200 block of Boothe Drive.

The ELVFD arrived and located the source of the smoke in the attic. The damage to the building was minor; and the smoke was ventilated from the building.

Geisler attends firemen's school

Jonathan Geisler, volunteer fireman for the Rock Island Volunteer Fire Department (RIVFD), attended the 72nd Annual Municipal Firemen's Training School held July 22-27.

The school, attended by nearly 2,000 students representing about 750 cities from more than 25 states, was held at Texas A&M University Campus.

Firemen chose a course at the school from a listing which included Fire Fighting, Fire Prevention, Fire Department Officer Development, Fire Service Rescue Practices, Specialized Fire Protection and Public Safety Emergency Service Dispatcher.

Geisler was sponsored by the Colorado County Farm Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies who contributed toward the cost of the school.

Since volunteer firemen are interested in attending this school to help do a better job for fire fighting and fire prevention, 125 county Farm Bureaus and the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies in the statewide program have sponsored 125 firemen at the school.

"Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies believe volunteer fire departments have been very effective in reducing the amount of loss involved by fire in rural areas," said Texas Farm Bureau President Donald Patman of Waxahachie. "It is our hope, in sponsoring this program, that the fireman will help the RIVFD to better serve the residents of Colorado County."

CORNS VS. CALLUSES

Corns and calluses develop to protect the foot from excess pressure or friction. The body responds to the problem by causing the affected skin to thicken. Pressure or friction can occur when the foot rubs the inside of the shoe or if a bone lies in an abnormal position. While unsightliness is typically the main concern with corns and calluses, they can become infected or hamper foot movement in some cases. Corns usually grow on top of the foot on a toe joint. They can appear as a slight thickening or an uncomfortably firm bump. Calluses typically develop and spread on the sole of the foot or on the outer edge of the toe or heel.

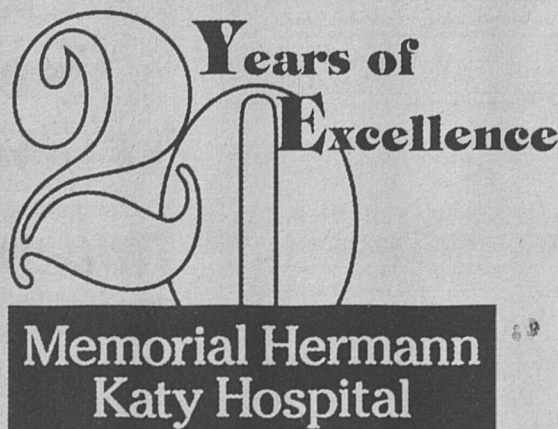
