Corns and calluses develop to protect the foot from excess pressure or friction. The body responds to the problem by causing the affected skin to thicken. Pressure or friction can occur when the foot rubs the inside of the shoe or if a bone lies in an abnormal position. While unsightliness is typically the main concern with coms and calluses, they can become infected or hamper foot movement in some cases. Corns usually grow on top of the foot on a toe joint. They can appear as a slight thickening or an uncomfortably firm bump. Calluses typically develop and spread on the sole of the foot or on the outer edge of the toe or heel.
