## Texas 4-H shooting sports matches held

The 2001 Texas 4-H Shooting Sports Match was held at the National Shooting Complex in San Antonio July 15-21.

Participating in this year's 4-H archery events were 70 competitors from across the state of Texas.

Three archers from Colorado County participated in this match. their divisions and placings were:

F.I.T.A.: Sub-junior recurve division: Simone Petrosky, 4th place; Meagan Ross, 10th; senior recurve division: Matthew Ross, 3rd.

In the team event, Meagan Ross shot along with Dex and Dillon Dean of Milam County, placing fourth.

The 2001 National 4-H Shooting Sports Invitational Match was held at the National Shooting Sports Complex in San Antonio, July 15-21.

Eleven states competed in this year's invitational match.

Representing Texas on the 4-H Archery Recurve Team was Matthew Ross of Colorado County. Members of the team also included, Dex Dean, Milam County; William Dybala, Matagorda County; and Trey Reagan, Goliad County.

Alternates were Sage Adams, Bexar County; Ryan Boenicke, Brown County; and Matthew Huebner, Matagorda County.

Ross placed individually in the following divisions: F.I.T.A., second place; Field, 2nd; 3-D, 3rd; overall 4-H recurve shooter, 2nd silver award.

The Texas 4-H Archery Recurve Team placed first in all three divisions (F.I.T.A., Field, 3-D).

They also received first place in the Team Round and took home first place high team total award for the National competition.

The Texas 4-H Archery Compound team consisted of: T.J. Crawford, Brown County; Jeff Kallus, Lavaca County; Meaghan Metzler, Calhoun County; and Anna Weiss, Lavaca County.

Alternates were Chase Cantrell, Jackson County; and Jesse Richmon, Brown County.

This team took home third place high team total award for the National competition.

Ending the 2001 National Shooting Sports Invitation Match, the National 4-H Shooting Sports Championship trophy was awarded to the state which had the highest number of points acquired throughout the match in the following events: archery, hunting, muzzleloading, pistol and rifle, silhouette and shotgun.

The Texas Team was the recipient of this award for the second year in a row.

Sponsored by the Texas Justice Court Training Center, the seminar's purpose is to update judges and court

clerks on bills creating new laws and constitutional amendments.

Some of the topics were civil lawsuits, civil trial procedure, landlord-tenant issues, increases in court costs and fees, writs of execution and disposition of stolen property.

Monday, Aug. 6, Dulany and Thomas traveled to Galveston to the Texas Department of Health Bureau of Vital Statistics Regional Conference.

This training is also necessary since the Justice Court office also serves as a State Registrar's Office.

Conference topics included birth and death registration overviews and data quality, fetal death fraud and permits, local registrar duties, delayed record birth, death record fraud and misuse, difficult death situations, and future consolidation of State Registrars offices throughout the state.

### Medicines Sometimes Help Autistic Children

Autism is a brain-related disorder that affects normal development of social and communication skills. Autistic children and adults tend not to form close personal relationships, won't cuddle, resist change, and often repeat certain acts and rituals. If speech develops it may be abnormal in word choice, rate, rhythm, or pitch. And in severe cases, aggressive or self-injurious behavior may be present. Autism and associated behaviors occur in as many as 1 in 500 persons, with males more likely to be autistic than girls. However, autism affects persons of various races and social backgrounds about equally.

A variety of medicines that affect the brain and nervous system are often helpful, but they do not resolve the underlying problem. For example, the antipsychotic medicine *haloperidol* (Haldol) is used to control severely aggressive or self-destructive behaviors and abnormal repetitive movements. *Clonidine* (Catapres), which typically is used to help lower high blood pressure, may reduce irritability and hyperactivity and improve social functioning. Antidepressant medicines, including fluoxetine (Prozac), may be helpful in select instances.
