

Gertson will learn to inspect, troubleshoot, repair, replace, test and perform support maintenance on the Avenger short-range air-defense systems and associated equipment, assemblies and sub-assemblies.

The Avenger is a lightweight, highly mobile, and transportable surface-to-air missile fire unit equipped with pods for Stinger missiles and a .50 caliber machine gun on an electric turret mounted on top of a mobile, multi-purposed wheeled vehicle.

Gertson is a 1999 graduate of Rice High School.

Once in Fredericksburg, PT-309 will be housed in a climate-controlled building in the museum's new threeacre Pacific Combat Zone that will open Dec. 7.


