Louis was reunited with his platoon leader, Gerald (Rudy) Rudisill,

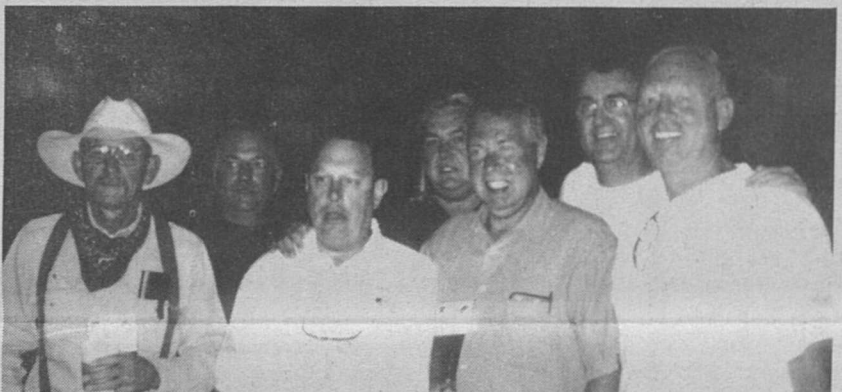
(Ret. Army General and Consultant Aide to General Shelton of the Joint Chiefs of Staff).

Columbus, \$616,132.68, +7.17%; Weimar, \$155,980.63, +35.65%; Sealy, \$760,413.17, -9.43%; Bellville, \$372,951.21, +10.99%; El Campo, \$1,577,602.38, +5.14%; and Wharton, \$922,569.66, +10.86%.

On the county level, Colorado County received \$50,668.21, up 11.94%. Austin County received \$67,295.81, down 5.72%. Wharton County received \$137,177.19, up 12.86%.

Year-to-date figures for these counties are: Colorado, \$520,181.17, up 11.91%; Austin, \$593,992.32, down 9.28%; Wharton, \$1,177,955.46, +7.27%.

fee based revenue.

Production limits of some number of acre-feet per acre planted, or per acre owned or by size of well has to be in the rules of operation for a GCD so that there is some protection against abusive production by exporters. The district will have to work with the agricultural industry to arrive at limits that will satisfy all.

Currently, the Advisory Board has gathered both technical studies and guesses of what it takes to irrigate a rice crop. Unfortunately, most of the technical studies are from Wharton County. This data suggests that 4 acre-feet of groundwater per acre planted will be a starting point in discussions.

Row crops use 1.0 a-ft to 1.5 a-ft per acre and have a maximum drought need of 2 acre-feet per acre. There is also potential to use the well size and gallons per minute production capacity to determine spacing between wells and number of acres allocated per well. For comparison, the Gonzales GCD has 2 acre-feet per acre owned production limit. The elected board will have to resolve this issue.

Colorado County's rice industry only irrigates about 18% of their acreage each year with groundwater from wells. The Gulf Coast Aquifer has not shown any significant water level declines so far with this use.

The GCD's challenge will be to maintain sustainability of our groundwater resources for our economic future. If we allow more water to be pumped than is put back into the aquifer by recharge, the resource is being mined and not sustained.

Scientific knowledge on groundwater availability and recharge is not very good right now. The Texas Water Development Board has initiated projects to define these parameters but the results will only be useful in a regional sense; that is, not applicable to identifying them for small areas of a county.

The results of these projects are to be used by the Regional Water Planning Groups and the GCDs. The only way these organizations can be modified to reflect specific areas in our

county will be through efforts at well data collection and analysis by the Post Oak GCD.

Why do we need this information? The district will need it to evaluate the effect of new nonexempt wells on the aquifer before granting a permit.

Medicines Used to Manage Psoriasis

Psoriasis is a chronic disease that affects the growth and turnover of skin cells and causes scaling. This condition often begins in persons aged 10 to 40, but all age groups are susceptible. The problem usually starts as a few small skin patches or plaques that become excessively flaky. The plaques may remain thumbnail size or grow as ring-shaped or spiral patterns to encompass large areas of the body.

For mild cases of psoriasis, use of a well-formulated skin lotion twice daily can help provide needed moisture as healing occurs. Steroid ointments or creams containing *desoximetasone* (Topicort) or *diflorasone* (Psorcon) may be prescribed by physicians. Their effectiveness may be increased by wrapping the affected area with plastic wrap after applying the medicine. Moderate psoriasis may require ointments, creams, or shampoos containing *coal tar* or *salicylic acid*. Exposure to ultraviolet light — sometimes in conjunction with a sensitizing agent — helps sufferers of extensive psoriasis. Widespread plaques may require stronger medicines such as *methotrexate* (Rheumatrex) or *cyclosporine* (Neoral), both of which sometimes produce undesirable side effects.
