

LIP AND CHEEK BITING

is mostly found in kids and young grown-ups. It can be caused by: nervousness; trauma from an accident; bad or a bad bite in which the cheek is bitten every time you chew.

Generally, this is discovered because the wound is either painful, bleeding or both. The treatment is partly your responsibility and partly the dentist's. The dentist can correct the problem caused by an accident, bad filling, or a bad bite. If the problem is caused by nervous chewing (asleep or awake), you're going to have to work on 3525.

Lip and cheek biting (from the inside) your head, find out why you think it is happening (source) and stop doing what's causing it. Perhaps your girlfriend or boss is hassling you. You fillings rubbing on the cheek or tongue; could just be sleeping in an awkward position

As for the immediate pain or trauma. you can rinse with hydrogen peroxide, salt water or both. Just, please make sure you eliminate the real cause of the
