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

CCHC holds open house at Zimmerscheidt School

A crowd of nearly 200 area residents and former students turned out for an Open House at the historic Zimmerscheidt School near Frelsburg Sunday, Oct. 28.

The event was sponsored by the Colorado County Historical Commission (CCHC) which recently completed restoration work on the one-room school established in 1855.

The afternoon's activities began at 3 p.m. with a welcome by Rollin Baker, CCHC chairman, who served as Master of Ceremonies.

The invocation was delivered by Tom Stallman, great-great grandson of Jurgen Stallman, one of three original trustees of the school.

Theodore Schultz, CCHC member, led in the pledge of the U.S. flag. A history of the Zimmerscheidt School was given by Crockett Leyendecker, CCHC member, who served as chairman of the restoration project.

Former Colorado County Agent Doyle Moore shared some of his recollections of the Zimmerscheidt community and the programs offered in the Veterans Vocational Building located behind the school.

Leyendecker recognized all former students in attendance and a commemorative photograph was taken of the group.

Colleen Willrodt, CCHC secretary, extended words of appreciation to everyone who had a part in the day's festivities. The Trinity Lutheran Church Choirs sang several songs and hymns in German and concluded with "God Bless America".

The benediction and blessing was given by Pamela Potter, CCHC publicity chairman and president of the CSD Board of Trustees.

Following the program, a chicken stew supper was served on the grounds. The meal was prepared by Peggy and Dean Venghaus, Lilie and Lester Weishuhn, Dorothy and Crockett Leyendecker, Verna Nell and Leon Dittmar Jr., Herbert Aschenbeck and Steven Glaeser.

Members of the CCHC provided a variety of homemade cakes, pies and cookies for dessert.

Where did October go? I didn't get all of my October gardening chores done and its already time to start November garden chores.

It's time to dig caladiums and store for the winter and give your Louisiana irises cotton seed meal and your Bearded and Dutch irises want bone meal.

Any other bulbs will want bone meal and superphosphate along with a good covering of mulch.

Finally, I think the weather is cooling off enough so we can go ahead and put out our pansies and snap dragons. Use a little blood meal under the plants.

Helyn Farris (one of Eagle Lake's treasures) suggested several weeks ago that people start thinking about planting a variety of trees other than the many cultivars of oaks.

Now is a good time to plant flowering and fruit trees. But, as a rule, they don't grow as large or live as long as the oaks. However, they reward us in other ways.

One of the prettiest blooming trees is the cassias and there are a number of them blooming now around Eagle Lake. They are small trees with large clusters of yellow blooms covering them.

Another showy tree is the Chinese Pistache. It is a sturdy spreading tree that has lovely fall color. The female trees have berries. It will do very well in this area.

Last Saturday, I drove from one side of Eagle Lake to the other and it was wonderful to see the Halloween and fall displays in the yards.

On Clay Street and Lake, I saw a ghost and scarecrow and on Strickland I saw the remains of a witch that had crashed into the ground.

On Keith Street, I drove away rather fast from a house where a pumpkin man sat holding a skeleton head in his hand.


