

Cranek, Mathis plan Feb. wedding



Aching feet are a common problem for pregnant women. As a woman gains weight during pregnancy, her center of gravity changes. She stands and walks differently, which places pressure on her knees and feet. Two common foot problems associated with pregnancy-related weight gain are over-pronation and edema. With over-pronation, or flat feet, a woman's feet roll inward while walking. This condition can cause pain while straining the feet, calves, and/or back. Edema, or swelling in the feet, typically occurs toward the end of a pregnancy and results from excess blood accumulating in the lower extremities. Blood vessels in the pelvis and legs constrict as the growing uterus pushes outward, slowing circulation and causing blood to pool toward the feet.

Just as you put your prenatal care in the hands of a specialist, so should you entrust your hard-working feet to a specialist - a podiatrist. This is a great format for participants with specific projects in mind, as well as those who are just curious.


Everyone is encouraged to take advantage of this exciting opportunity to expand his or her knowledge about Texas Historical Markers.


