

EAGLE LAKE POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Eagle Lake Police Department (ELPD) reported the following calls and cases for the week ending Nov. 26.

Nov. 19, at 1:25 p.m., Officer Bryan Lasley received complaints from citizens about two girls in town attempting to sell products door to door. The two girls were located and identified as being from out of state. They were warned and advised of the city's ordinance against unauthorized door to door solicitation.

At 4:51 p.m., Lt. Clem Johnson was dispatched to the Thomas Clinic in reference to a dog bite victim who claimed a dog had bitten her at a residence in the 400 block of East C Street Nov. 17. The animal control officer was dispatched to that residence and the dog was placed in quarantine.

Nov. 20, at 2:30 p.m., Officer Lasley assisted with traffic control while a cable company stretched cable across Boothe Drive.

At 3:56 p.m., Officer Wendy Alley arrested Adrian "Quick" Carroll for felony theft as the result of her investigation into the Nov. 9 theft of a child's bicycle. Because Carroll has been convicted of theft on prior occasions, Officer Alley was able to file felony enhancement to the misdemeanor theft charge. Carroll was booked at the Colorado County Jail.

At 4:21 p.m., Sgt. Tim Crume was flagged down in the 900 block of Glen Flora Road by a complainant who stated his pit bull dog had been stolen from his residence in the 1300 block of Murphy St. the night before. The case is under investigation.

At 6:10 p.m., Officer Rosalinda Perez responded to an activated business burglary alarm at the Eagle Lake General Store on FM 3013. The alarm was deemed to be false.

Nov. 21, at 10:25 a.m., Officer Lasley was called to the scene of a property dispute in the 200 block of Boothe Drive. The dispute involved three men, one of whom was the owner; the second man, a renter in arrears; and the third was a man the renter had sublet the property to.

At 9:39 p.m., Officer Perez was called to the 300 block of S. Lake Ave. in reference to a bar patron parking their vehicle in their driveway while the driver visited a local bar. Perez located the errant driver and required him to vacate the driveway.

Nov. 22, at 12:06 a.m., Officer Perez was called to the scene of a distur-

bance at Anna Mae's Cafe on First St. Perez learned a patron had turned over a table inside the cafe and was refusing to leave. Perez was successful in removing the stubborn customer.

At 1:56 a.m., Officer Perez was called to a residence on Hunter's Lane in reference to Michael Hernandez knocking on the door trying to sell the complainant a used television set.

At 11:27 a.m., Officer Lasley took a gas drive-off report from B&B Food Store. The clerk recorded the alleged thief's license plate number, which was turned over to the officer.

At 4:38 p.m., an observant neighbor reported to Sgt. Bill Lattimore that a person was seen crawling through a window of a house. Lattimore investigated the report and found the window "mole" was actually a resident of the house.

At 7:56 p.m., Officer Perez arrested Johnny Frausto Jr. for being intoxicated in a parking lot in the 600 block of E. Main St. An effort was made to find a family member who would be willing to take responsibility of Frausto but none could be found. He was then booked in at the Colorado County Jail.

Nov. 23, at 2:55 p.m., Officer Steve Nelson met with several concerned citizens in the 600 block of East A Street after they had found a four-year-old wandering around the neighborhood. Officer Nelson located a 17-year-old male who was supposed to be babysitting his four-year-old brother. The siblings were reunited.

At 9:59 p.m., Sgt. Lattimore responded to call of a young Hispanic female being seen in the downtown area with blood on her arms. After searching the area for 30 minutes, Lattimore contacted Rice Medical Center and learned 17-year-old Ashley Cardenas of Eagle Lake had shown up with superficial wounds to her arms.

Lattimore observed Cardenas was intoxicated. Cardenas' parents were eventually located and summoned to the hospital. The department is investigating this incident as criminal offense of providing alcohol to a minor. Two suspects have been developed.

Nov. 24, at 2:27 a.m., Sgt. Lattimore was dispatched outside the city on FM 102 north to check out an activated burglar alarm for the county deputies. Lattimore found everything to be okay.

At 1:56 p.m., Officer Nelson took a report from a citizen who had just

learned he had a counterfeit \$10 bill when he tried to spend it at a local store. The case will be forwarded to the U.S. Secret Service.

At 3:48 p.m., Sgt. Lattimore was called to a residence at which children living there had found a stray/lost hunting dog. Lattimore investigated SPCA numbers found on the dog's collar and was able to reunite the two old hunting buddies later that same evening. The dog's owner lived in Katy and had reportedly lost the dog while hunting in the Lissie area. The owner rewarded the children with a gift for reporting the dog to the ELPD.

Nov. 25, at 1:23 a.m., Sgt. Lattimore, Officers Arnold Terrazas and Alley and several Colorado County deputies responded to reports of a fire alarm being discharged at Didner Hall located at 201 Crain.

Didner Hall is owned and operated by the Parish of the Nativity in Eagle Lake, who routinely rents the hall out for private parties. That was the case in this incident.

Several residents had rented the hall for a large birthday party which got out of hand. Officers were able to disperse a large angry crowd which had gathered outside the hall.

A short time later, the officers were called over to Third St. after residents there reported a large fight in the street, including someone being stabbed.

County deputies and city police officers responded and found numerous persons fighting. One person was arrested for disorderly conduct because of the fighting and the others were eventually dispersed.

A few minutes later, the hospital called to report that two stabbing victims had arrived via private cars.

Sgt. Lattimore discovered that 23-year-old Anthony Daniels and 21-year-old Eric Johnson were being treated in the emergency room for stab and cut wounds. The two were able to identify their assailants.

Daniels was transported to Hermann Hospital via Life Flight and Johnson was transported to the same

hospital by ambulance. Both required surgery and were released a few days later.

Nov. 27, Justice of the Peace Larry Dulany issued two felony aggravated assault warrants to the ELPD for 20-year-old Lamonte Miller and 19-year-old Terrell Miller, both of Eagle Lake.

As of 6 p.m. Nov. 27, neither of the two has been arrested. Additional arrest warrants are pending on at least two additional suspects.

At 5:42 a.m., Officer Nelson was dispatched to a domestic disturbance in the 1200 block of E. Main St. The situation was resolved by one of the individuals seeking another place to stay for the day.

At 7:06 p.m., Officer Terrazas was called to J&K's Corner in reference to a gas drive-off incident.

At 8:08 p.m., Officer Terrazas in-

vestigated an activated alarm at 205 FM 3013. No forced entry or break in was found.

Nov. 26, at 9:26 a.m., Officer Nelson on-viewed a traffic accident on E. Main St. in front of Super Stop #25. In the accident, Isley Edwards was traveling west bound on E. Main in the outside lane, driving a Buick.

A.C. Henry was traveling east bound on E. Main and had stopped in the inside lane, waiting to turn left into the Super Stop #25 parking lot.

An 18-wheeler gravel truck, traveling west bound in the inside lane, had stopped short of the red light to allow Henry to execute his left hand turn. When Henry did so, he failed to yield right of way to Edwards who's vehicle was hidden by the gravel truck and trailer.

Edwards swerved to avoid injur-

ing Henry and ended up striking the utility pole along the curb line in front of the store. The vehicle's impact caused the utility pole to fracture in the middle. AEP/CPL crews arrived to remove the damaged pole and installed a new one.

At 12:30 p.m., Officer Nelson responded to Campbell Road to assist the county on a call. An alert citizen had found two men stealing a dog belonging to Keith Austin. The citizen used his own vehicle to block the alleged dog-nappers' getaway car from fleeing the scene.

Officer Nelson arrived and identified the dog nappers as being Hollis Shorter and Leathan Shirley.

County Deputy Lacourse arrived later, arrested the two and booked them into the county jail after charged. (See ELPD, Page 9)

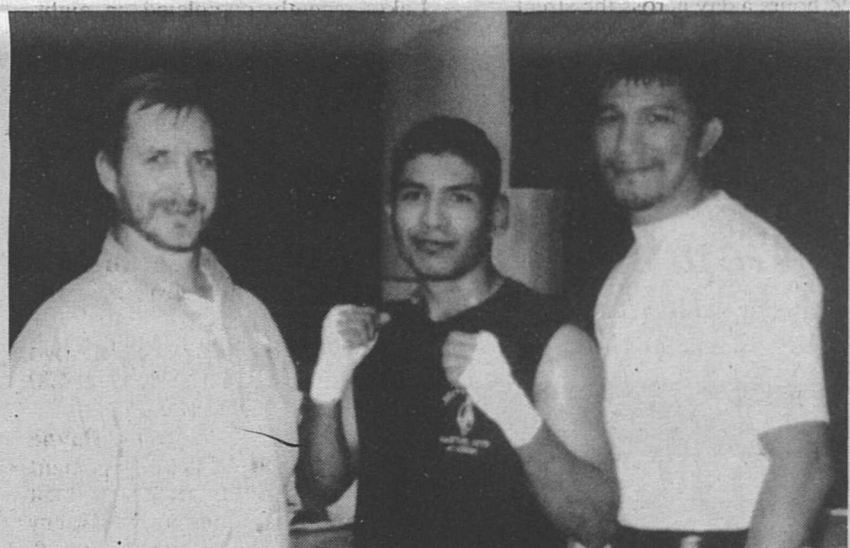

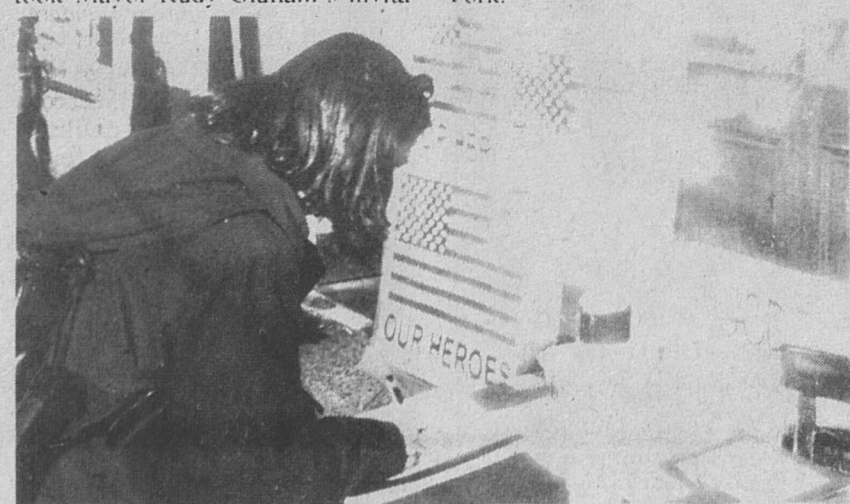
