Hammertoes occur when toes bend downward excessively, while clawtoes involve an excessive upward bend of the joint of the ball of the foot - the metatarsal phalangeal (MTP) joint. Clawtoes often develop in conjunction with hammertoes and affect the four smaller toes. Hammertoes typically affect the proximal interphalangeal (PIP) joints, between the first and second bones of the toe. Shoes are the most common culprit responsible for hammertoes and clawtoes. When shoes are too short, pointy, or high-heeled (many are a combination of all three), feet are squeezed constantly. Over time, the feet contract to accommodate the shoes. Nerve conditions due to genetics or injury can also lead to clawtoes.

Switching to a properly fitting shoe often relieves the condition. After any on-the-job foot injury, be sure to follow through with a professional diagnosis and treatment plan from your podiatrist.
