

EAGLE LAKE POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Eagle Lake Police Department (ELPD) reported the following calls and cases for the week ending March 4.

Feb. 26, at 6:10 p.m., Sgt. Tim Crume and Officer Rosalinda Perez directed traffic at the intersection of Beaks and Main Streets for a train that had derailed. No injuries were reported. The train was not blocking the roadway, however, the railroad crossing signals had engaged and would not release. Officers stood by until the arms were dismantled.

THE GARBAGE IS A BIG ISSUE!!!!

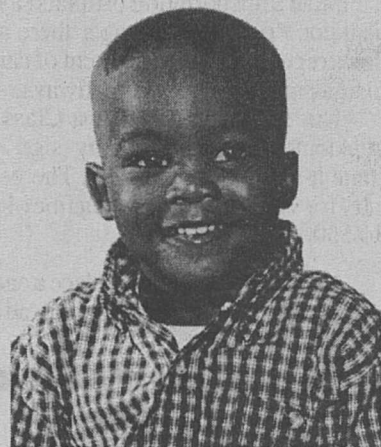

Foot Facts

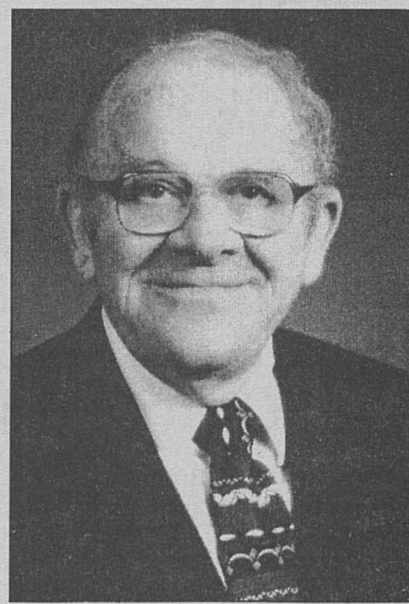

HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE & THE FEET

It is important to mention systemic conditions like high blood pressure (hypertension) or heart conditions to all treating doctors, including your podiatrist. Medications taken for hypertension, diabetes, and other conditions may interact with medications taken for foot conditions, and some medications should be avoided before surgery. High blood pressure can cause decreased circulation. Any swelling of the feet, whether persistent or periodic, is important to mention to a podiatrist because it could mean that high blood pressure is affecting the extremities. Burning in the feet can also signal decreased circulation. High blood pressure is a major risk factor for heart disease and stroke. The podiatrist will monitor blood pressure and refer patients to their primary physicians whenever levels become elevated.
