





DPS says I-20 not a bad road

The recent spate of multi-fatality accidents on Interstate 20, the interstate that crosses the upper portion of Texas from east to west, is attributable to the people who have used it, not the road.

That's the view of the Texas DPS, which says the culprits in the crashes are excessive speed and impaired drivers.

The statistics also show the 3,000plus miles of interstate highways in the state are safer than other roadways: Of 3,519 fatalities in Texas in 1999, the DPS said, only 216 were on interstate highways.

More than 1,400 people died in accidents in cities and towns with a population greater than 5,000.
