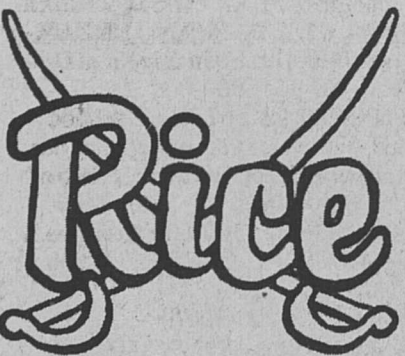

### Rice CISD is awarded two grants

The alternative school(s) of Rice CISD recently received \$50,000 for improvements to technology from the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF). These non-competitive grants will provide the Colorado County Juvenile Boot Camp with funding for computer links to District campuses. The grant funds were targeted to alternative schools so that those students and instructors would have equitable access to modern technology. Alternative campuses typically provide instruction to at-risk and economically disadvantaged students. These students will have the opportunity to earn technology application credits and become more competitive in the job market upon graduation. "It is imperative that all students have positive learning opportunities," said Richard E. Gott, Ph.D., Superintendent, and Ralph Gertson, Project Director for this grant. "Using this funding for technology will assist this campus in providing an improved digital environment for the students. Upon graduation, these students will have had the chance to learn many of the technology skills necessary to compete in today's job market." The Rice CISD is also pleased to announce an award of \$100,000 from the TIF Board. A portion of the grants funds will be used to provide Rice High School and Eagle Lake Middle School with staff development for

teachers to integrate technology into curriculum. This non-competitive TIF grant focuses on supporting teacher training so that Texas teachers become skilled in using technology and integrating technology into all phases of their lessons. Rice Consolidated allocated 20% of the awarded funds to offer staff development technology. The TIF grant will assist the district in meeting Texas Education Agency requirement that schools provide Technology Application courses. (The remaining funds will be budgeted for continued staff development and/or equipment necessary to carry out what has been learned.) Not only will teachers gain advantage from this training and funding, the students will be the ultimate beneficiaries. Students will be offered a curriculum that has technology integrated within it, making the technology an integral learning tool in preparing for the digital era. "We are excited about receiving this grant award for our teachers, and ultimately for the students they instruct," said Ralph Gertson, Project Director for this grant. "This additional funding will help our district meet the needs of our teachers and students in the 21<sup>st</sup> century." Since its creation by the 74<sup>th</sup> Legislature in 1995, TIF has awarded approximately \$1 billion in grants to its four constituent groups-public schools, libraries, institutions for higher education, and public, not-for-profit healthcare facilities.

## Foot Facts

### ATHLETE'S FOOT

Athlete's foot, or tinea pedis, is a fungal infection that most commonly strikes adult males and teenagers. This condition is not contagious. The fungi that cause athlete's foot thrive in moist, warm places. Failure to dry feet thoroughly after bathing or swimming, excessively sweaty feet, and tight-fitting socks are contributing factors in the development of athlete's foot. Symptoms of the condition include peeling and cracking skin - especially between the toes - that may be accompanied by redness, scaling, and itching. Some may experience blisters along the soles and sides of the feet. To ensure effective treatment for athlete's foot, a correct diagnosis is important. Some over-the-counter rash medications can exacerbate athlete's foot. Anti-fungal creams are often effective in treating the condition. Home treatments for athlete's foot may bring short-term, temporary relief, but medical answers are your best bet for the long-term. Here at Rice Medical Center, our aim is to prevent, not just repair. ### Register for ACT exam by Aug. 23

The next ACT Assessment will be administered Sept. 28, 2002. College-bound high school students must register for the college admissions exam by Aug. 23 - the deadline for having the registration postmarked. There is a late registration postmark deadline of Sept. 6, but an extra fee is charged for late registration. Students can get registration packets from their high school counselors or register online at [www.act.org](http://www.act.org). ACT scores are accepted by virtually all U.S. colleges and universities, including all Ivy League schools. The ACT is not an aptitude test - it is an academic achievement test that measures students on what they learned in high school. Because it is curriculum-based, colleges use ACT scores for more than admissions decisions - they use scores to place freshmen into classes that the students are academically prepared to handle. For admissions decisions, colleges use ACT scores along with a student's high school grade point average, college prep courses taken, extracurricular activities and other information. The test fee is \$25 (\$28 in Florida). ACT's website ([www.act.org](http://www.act.org)) has helpful information, sample tests and the opportunity to order test prep materials such as *Active Prep*, an interactive CD-ROM that contains practice tests with instant scores and study plans to prepare for the real test. A free sample test is available from high school counselors in a brochure called *Preparing For The ACT Assessment*.
