ACT deadline is Nov. 8

College-bound high school students who want to take the ACT Assessment have two chances to register before the Dec. 14 test date.

The postmark registration deadline is Friday, Nov. 8.

There is also a late registration postmark deadline Nov. 21 (an additional fee is required for late registration).

Students can get information from their high school counselor or register online at www.act.org.

ACT scores are accepted by virtually all colleges in the nation, including all Ivy League schools.

A student's ACT scores are considered by college for admissions and course placement, along with several other important factors including high school GPA, college prep courses taken in high school, extracurricular activities, personal background and other information.

The test fee is \$25 (\$28 in Florida). To learn more about the ACT Assessment, including registration forms and test locations, contact your high school counselor or go to the ACT website (www.act.org), which also offers useful tips, sample tests and the opportunity to order inexpensive test prep materials.

Civic Garden Club

I am sorry I was unable to give some Gold Star Awards for the month of Oct., but time just got away from me. I will try to do better for Nov. if everything doesn't wash away.

There are many garden tasks to take care of in Nov., so go ahead and plan what you want to plant or what beds you want to redo and maybe by this weekend we all can begin to enjoy the month.

Clean up the flowerbeds and dis-

card dead foliage and all debris that would allow insects and plant diseases a place to overwinter.

After your chrysanthemums and perennials are finished, cut them down all the way to the ground so they can develop good strong root growth.

Snapdragons, stock and other suck flowers need to be top pinched (this is always hard for me to do) to keep flowers from forming too early and getting frost bitten. Top pinching will produce a fuller plant. Also, when you plant your pansies use a small amount of blood meal under each plant.

Continue to lightly feed your roses but, of course, don't use a nitrogen fertilizer.

If you are thinking about building new flowerbeds, this is a really good time to do so. Since our soil is generally heavy, dig down about six inches and just turn it over and cover it with gypsum, the leaves you rake from your yard and, if you're lucky enough to have a source for strong manure, throw that on also. Then, let it weather until you are ready to plant next spring.

Plant your fruit trees and flowering shrubs now.

If you are planting bulbs, work one teaspoon of bone and superphosphate into the soil below the bulb then add more soil and sand, placing the bulb on the sand so it won't touch the fertilizer. Then cover with soil and give them some water.

You can mulch the bulbs with an organic mulch such as shredded oak leaves, etc. but be sure to scrape the material away as soon as the new green shoots start to emerge.

If you plan to plant tulips, refrigerate them now so they will be ready to put into the garden by late Dec.

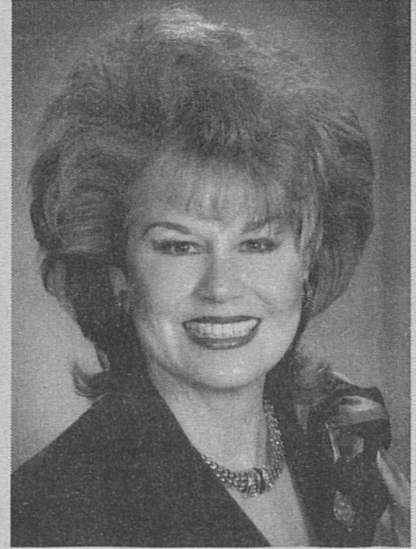

ANTI-STAIN PRODUCTS - YES OR NO?
 If you have badly stained front teeth, be careful before buying an over-the-counter product that is claimed to solve the problem. There are no commercial products on the market today that can compare to professional dental treatment for correcting stained teeth. Some products can even harm the teeth with excessive amounts of cleaning abrasive.
 If your teeth have already lost a certain amount of enamel and you use a strong abrasive product, you can severely damage the dentin or exposed cementum (the inner part of the teeth) which may actually be the cause of the staining. Some people buy products to remove this type of yellowish stain only to find after extended use that the teeth become even darker and more eroded.
 Therefore, never use a commercial product for treatment of stained teeth unless your dentist first prescribes it. Save your money! If you want your teeth to look lighter, visit your dentist and request professional treatment. Bleaching, bonding, or crowning can solve the problem.
