"If protecting yourself in case of a crash isn't enough, law enforcement will give you another reason to buckle up: a citation that can cost from \$25 to \$200, plus court costs," said Senior Trooper Gary Pflughaupt. "As Texas residents plan for their Memorial Day holiday, they need to remember that not buckling up can cost them, whether it's a fine, a serious injury or worse."

During 2000, 3,769 people were killed and over 300,000 injured on Texas roads and highways. Many of those could have been prevented if the victims had been wearing safety belts.


