## Prairie Chicken Refuge To Host Youth Employment Program

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Attwater Prairie Chicken (APC) National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) is accepting applications for summer employment in the Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) program.

This program offers gainful employment to youth interested in wildlife conservation for eight weeks in an outdoor atmosphere.

Enrollees will be paid the minimum wage of \$5.15 for a 40-hour work week. Work will begin on June 5 and end on July 28, 2006.

Youth must be at least 15 years of age when the program starts and must be no more than 18 when the program ends. All applicants must be U.S. citizens and meet the eligibility requirements as set forth on the official YCC application.

No prior work experience is required, but we do encourage all youth interested in a conservation career, with a federal or state agency, to apply.

Employment is without regard to social, economic, racial or ethnic background. The YCC program is for both young women and men.

The YCC program is a well-balanced work-learn program that develops an understanding and appreciation of our environment and heritage.

Some of the projects the enrollees will work on are erecting Attwater's prairie-chicken acclimation pens, fenceline clearing, litter clean-up, exotic plant removal, community service, first aid/CPR certification, and environmental education.

Enrollees must furnish their own transportation to and from the refuge daily. Work hours will be 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Applications will be accepted until April 26, 2006 at the Attwater Prairie Chicken NWR, located approximately 6.5 miles northeast of Eagle Lake or 10 miles southwest of Sealy on FM 3013.

Mailed applications must be postmarked no later than April 26. Applications may be obtained from your local high school principal or their designated person, by calling the Attwater Prairie Chicken NWR at (979) 234-3021 ext. 18, or by writing to P.O. Box 519, Eagle Lake, Texas 77434.

Selections will be accomplished by random drawing by an impartial person outside the refuge system to ensure fair selection.

All individuals selected must have a social security number prior to going to work. It takes about four weeks to receive a social security number after applying to the Federal Social Security Administration.

## Subscribe To The Headlight

It depends on the type of grass you are growing and the lawn appearance you desire. It is best to fertilize when grass is actively growing and can take up the fertilizer.

Fertilizer is best applied during the growing season. The growing season is often measured as the period between the last spring and first autumn frost dates. The average growing season for Colorado County is eight (8) months.

The first Spring Nitrogen fertilizer application to warm-season grasses should begin after the grass has greened up and has been mowed several times.

This indicates the grass is actively growing and can readily use applied nitrogen. Once a lawn is maintained on an appropriate annual N fertilizer program there is usually enough residual spring N to maintain grass through several mowings.

The first application of fertilizer should be made after the second or third mowing of the lawn grass.

Mowing weeds does not count. This would put your first Nitrogen application around April 1.

During the summer supplemental N applications should be spaced at least 45 to 60 days apart.

Slow release N sources are particularly suited for summer fertilizer applications to prevent surges of lush growth and the need for more frequent mowing.
