Congressman Hinojosa Dedicates Art House

U.S. Congressman Ruben Hinojosa joined with the Lighthouse of Eagle Lake's board of directors and community supporters to officially dedicate Eagle Lake's first ever 'Art House'. This is the first facility of its kind dedicated to teaching Eagle

Lake's young people a multifaceted arts and crafts program.

Joining Congressman Hinojosa were Sam Kana, President, First National Bank of Eagle Lake, Bill Harrison, Chairman, First National Bank of Eagle Lake, Bob Whisnant, Founder, Southwest Concrete, Terry Rossignol and Justin Roach, Manager and Assistant Manager, Attwater National Wildlife Refuge, Michael Morales, Mayor, Eagle Lake and Chris Thacker, Pastor, First Baptist Church of Eagle Lake. Each of these organizations was specifically thanked for their support in making the new Art House a reality for Eagle Lake's youth.

Having begun in January 2004, the Lighthouse After School Program reports that it has been privileged to serve over 380 local youth and that these youth have attended over 9,000 times in the last two years. Over 9,000 full meals have been served at no cost to the youth.

The mission of the Lighthouse is to offer a multi-faceted, character, education and activity center focused on improving the quality of life for the youth of Eagle Lake. One board member stated, "We believe that any community is only as strong as its commitment to its youth and we believe that a community can be transformed by transforming its children."

This mission is made operational through four major program components: Facilities, Food, Child Development and Recreation. The critical Child Development component in particular is composed of four major areas: Comprehensive scholastic, personality, character, health, life issues

Gov. Hopeful Strayhorn Stops In Eagle Lake

Carole Keeton Strayhorn brought her independent campaign for Texas governor to Colorado County on Tuesday, March 21.

She gave an interview to the Headlight, gave a speech in Weimar and had a reception in Columbus.

In a rapid-fire delivery, Strayhorn blasted incumbent Gov. Rick Perry and said she can do a better job.

Strayhorn, who currently serves as state comptroller, said that she is running as an independent because Perry has so politically fractured the state that running as an independent "is the only way to get anything done."

Strayhorn said that Perry has had nine opportunities to address public education finance problems and hasn't gotten it fixed.

"Nothing is more important than education," she said. "My passion is education."

She said Perry has promised to fix school finance and lower property taxes and hasn't delivered on either measure.

But she also said he has promised a "bloody, brutal" campaign.

"That's one promise I believe he'll keep," she said.

"We've got to cut sky rocketing local property taxes and we need to say out loud we need more dollars for education," she said. At one time, Strayhorn said the state paid 60 percent of the cost of education, and now local districts pay 64 percent of the cost.


"If you're simply shifting the same dollars around, it's like rearranging the chairs on the Titanic, the problem's not going to go away," Strayhorn said.

And she added: "It's a shame to preach excellence and deliver mediocrity."

She said the governor's first pro-
