

tions after the Texas Youth Commission stopped putting juveniles in the facility.
 The facility was built in 1997 with a \$2.7 million grant.
 In other action, the commissioners, approved a resolution to implement improvements at the Robert R. Wells Airport. The total project cost is estimated to be \$80,000, with the state providing 90 percent and Colorado County providing 10 percent, or \$8,000.
 Project funds will be available in January 2007.
 Commissioners also appointed three members to a consultant selection committee for the airport. They are Dr. F.T. Barfield, Dr. Tom Hancher and Jim Whitcomb.
 Commissioners also:
 --Tabled action on setting a 45 mph speed limit on Kansteiner Road in Precinct 3 after four people expressed varying views on the matter.
 Two individuals L.E. and Jimmy Kansteiner said they felt the speed limit should be lower.
 Commissioner Tommy Hahn, in whose precinct the road is located, said he wanted to get more input from other residents in the area.
 --Accepted an amended plat for a subdivision across the Colorado River from the north part of Columbus. The subdivision is called the Providence Landing Subdivision.
 --Approved a division of 60.8 acres in Precinct No. 3, fronted by Cat Spring and A. Braden Road into nine tracts.
 --Authorized advertising for bids for construction of a sewer line, lift station and water main in the New Town area outside Eagle Lake.
 --Authorized advertising for bids for paving of about 6,400 square feet at the Colorado County Services Facility for parking and for EMS personnel. County Judge Al Jamison estimated the cost of the paving at between \$15,000 and \$17,000.
 --Approved a request by the Columbus Chamber of Commerce to use Beason's Park for an Independence Day Celebration on July 4.

its use as potable water for San Antonio and would resemble the lake at the South Texas Nuclear Project.
 The storage facilities would be fed by unused and excess river flows from the Colorado River and the water would be used to supplement the municipal water supply of the City of San Antonio, which is facing an impending water shortage crisis.
 Some of the water would also be used for farming irrigation.
 According to LCRA the project would make water available by conserving as much as 118,000 acre-feet of water per year for agricultural use, capturing excess and unused river flows to transfer between 50,000 and 150,000 acre-feet per year to San Antonio and pumping limited amounts of groundwater to be used for agriculture locally when sufficient surface water is not available.
 Construction of these facilities would not begin before 2010 after studies are completed on the project's environmental impact, as well as financial and technical feasibility.
 The six-year project study is currently in its third year.
 "We are studying the bay (Matagorda Bay) and estuary system to see if the project can be accomplished," said Leah Manning, LCRA Program Manager for the LCRA-SAWS Water Project. "We are studying the potential impact on the river and the economy. Now we need to see if there is land available to support the project," she added.



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
