A \$1,000 reward offered by Colorado County CrimeStoppers was recently paid to a citizen who provided information leading to the arrest of two burglary suspects and the recovery of the stolen property.

CrimeStoppers offered the reward after learning of the burglary of a Weimar High School classroom and the theft of three digital cameras on

May 7, 2006.

Responding to the tip, the Weimar Police Department confronted and obtained statements from Weimar students Joshua Ellison, 18, and Brandon Burley, 19. Both were indicted by the Colorado County grand jury on June 20, 2006.

"CrimeStoppers is happy to pay this reward to this person whose

identity will remain confidential," said CrimeStoppers President Bob Berger of Columbus.

"We will also seek reimbursement for this reward when the judge sentences the criminals who committed this crime", he added.

Hometown Health Tips On Minor Wounds, Snoring

College of Medicine Outdoor Activities May Lead To Cuts and Scrapes

The arrival of summer, people are taking advantage of the abundant sunshine to enjoy the outdoors.

But, activities such as running, hiking and biking can result in skinned elbows, cut knees and other assorted minor bumps and bruises.

According to C. Keith Stone, M.D., chair of the Department of Emergency Medicine in the Texas A&M Health Science Center College of Medicine, proper and immediate care of wounds can reduce inflammation, accelerate healing and minimize scarring.

"The benefit of taking care of

minor scrapes and wounds quickly is to prevent complications," said Dr. Stone, physician at Scott & White Memorial Hospital in Temple.

"The main complication that arises is infection, and if the wound is promptly cleaned and protected, the risk of infection is markedly reduced."

Care for small scrapes, cuts and abrasions takes three easy steps: clean the area around the wound, clean the wound itself and protect the wound from additional contamination.

First, clean the area around the wound with soap and warm water, making sure to rinse well, Dr. Stone said.

Then gently scrub the wound itself with mild soap and warm
