## THC Announces Courthouse Partnership

AUSTIN—They are the dominant landmark in many Texas counties, and to date, nearly 30 of the state's historic courthouses have been restored and returned to their original grandeur through the Texas Historical Commission's (THC) widely recognized Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program.

Now, with assistance from the Texas Land Title Association (TLTA), these and other historic courthouses in various stages of restoration will be assured of maintaining their renewed luster through a TLTA grant for a two-year pilot program to promote

ongoing, regular courthouse stewardship and care.

"We greatly appreciate Texas Land and Title Association's generous donation to help grant recipients provide the necessary maintenance to their historic courthouses," said THC Chairman John L. Nau, III.

"TLTA has taken the lead in this one-of-a-kind, public-private venture and it is incumbent upon the counties to now follow through with this unique opportunity to keep their historic courthouses in the condition they deserve."

Title companies have a long

relationship with Texas county courthouses, as guardians of the records and deeds of ownership of home and private property.

TLTA represents nearly 2,000 members who work to protect property owners from problems that could affect their legal right to own property.

"The Texas Land Title Association is proud to support the Texas Historical Commission's efforts to preserve and maintain our state's historic county courthouses," said TLTA President R. Bruce Boyer.

"Title companies are frequent

and appreciative users of courthouse resources and we believe this is an additional way to assist the counties we serve throughout Texas."

The Texas Courthouse Stewardship initiative will provide a series of training workshops, along with courthouse site visits and consultations with THC architects.

Incentives for courthouses participating in the Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program will be offered, as well as featured speakers on issues relevant to courthouse preservation.

The Texas Legislature established the Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program in 1999 and appropriated funding to preserve and protect the historic courthouses of Texas after they were placed on the National Trust for Historic Preservation's America's 11 Most Endangered Historic Places.

The program has received national recognition and multiple awards, and it has completed four rounds of grant funding with 112 counties participating.

The TLTA is a trade association founded in 1908 whose members include title insurance underwriting companies, title agents, companies that provide goods or services to the title industry and individuals employed by member companies.

The TLTA grant provides critical resources to counties needing the specialized training required for courthouse maintenance, without which the state could again face the same challenge to preserve these recently restored courthouses in 25 to 30 years.

## Texas Oil and Gas Statistics For June

### June Permits to Drill

The Texas Railroad Commission issued a total of 1,718 original drilling permits in June 2006 compared to 1,396 in June 2005.

The June total included 1,440 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 50 to re-enter existing well bores, and 228 for re-completions.

Permits issued in June 2006 included 313 oil, 408 gas, 951 oil and gas, 31 injection, zero service and 15 other permits.

### May Crude Oil Production

Texas preliminary May 2006 crude oil production averaged 883,157 barrels daily, down from

the 919,921 barrels daily average of May 2005.

The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for May 2006 is 27,451,981 barrels, a decrease from 28,554,760 barrels reported during May 2005.

### June Oil and Gas Completions

In June 2006, operators reported 362 oil, 481 gas, 10 injection and zero other completions compared to 275 oil, 1,084 gas, 33 injection and one other completion during June 2005.

Total well completions for 2006 year to date are 6,275 up from 5,189 recorded during the same

period in 2005.

Operators reported 1,116 holes plugged and zero dry holes in June 2006 compared to 648 holes plugged and zero dry holes in June 2005.

### May Natural Gas Production

Texas oil and gas wells produced 428,033,594 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas based upon preliminary production figures for May 2006, up from the May 2005 preliminary gas production total of 426,317,997 Mcf.

Texas production in May 2006 came from 133,636 oil and 71,287 gas wells.

### Kissing May Tell

Husbands and wives share many things, including certain bacteria associated with gum disease. Dr. Steven Offenbacher, assistant professor in the Department of Periodontology at Emory University, found that if one member of a couple had a certain type of bacteria at the gum line, chances were good that the other person had the same bacteria.

"There are specific organisms associated with periodontal disease that are found only in the mouth," says Offenbacher, "so it's possible that they're transmitted from one person to another from regular intimate contact."

Since the symptoms of periodontal disease are not always obvious, it's important to continue regular checkups with your dentist, who can check for signs of the disease.
