Sheridan First Responder Program

Sheridan first responder unit, known as squad 12 responds to calls in the area ranging from the county line at Highway 90 to the west Altair area.

The First Responder concept originated during the late 1970s and early 1980s when the United States Department of Transportation recognized a gap between those trained to administer first aid, whom generally receive around eight hours of training, and those qualified as Emer-

gency Medical Technician Basic, which typically requires around 120 hours of training.

Although they lack the transport capability of EMS ambulance units, having a trained individual on the scene earlier makes a crucial difference.

"Getting a patient stabilized and diagnosed earlier can make a world of difference, both to the patient immediately and in terms of letting the ambulance crew know what to expect when they arrive," said Emergency Management Coordinator Chuck Rogers.

Rogers also said that the local knowledge of first responders helps EMS locate remote accident sites.

In the area of the county this unit serves, response times may fall between 50 and 75 percent.

First Responder training generally lasts around 40 to 60 hours and helps provide more advanced in house medical knowledge to organizations lacking the resources for full EMT training, such as volunteer fire departments.

The volunteers for the First Responder program generally include former EMS employees as well as volunteer firefighters.

The volunteers include Helelene Mieth.

"I wanted to keep my EMT qualification current and wanted

to be able to provide some help," said Mieth.

The funding for the program came from state grants. Money for equipment came from a grant from the 911 & Trauma Fund of the South East Texas Trauma Regional Advisory Council while cash for training came of a TX-DOT Highway Safety Grant.
