dinner for eight donated by the Raymond Thomas family. This item will be featured this year on Saturday, Sept. 16.


Joe Herbert and Candy McCreary give of their time to serve as auctioneers. They present an exciting, fast moving auction that is fun to be apart of or to watch.

### Glucosamine May Restore Weakened Cartilage

Glucosamine is found naturally in cartilage. Its purpose is to create cushioning fluids and tissues around body joints. Cartilage acts as a cushion between the bones and permits smooth joint movement. Glucosamine may stimulate the building-blocks of cartilage, as well as work as an anti-inflammatory. Osteoarthritis is a condition which results from joint wear and tear. Cartilage functions to cushion the joints, and in osteoarthritis cartilage is deteriorating. This deterioration leads to pain, swelling, and loss of movement. Glucosamine may delay further joint degeneration, and help restore weakened cartilage.

While glucosamine shows promise as a treatment for pain associated with osteoarthritis, available data from human trials have not been conclusive. Long term studies are needed to better understand the effects of glucosamine. Alternative treatments for people suffering from osteoarthritis include acetaminophen (*Tylenol*), which is recommended for osteoarthritic pain. Anti-inflammatory medications, such as ibuprofen (*Advil* and *Motrin*), naproxen (*Aleve*), and aspirin may also be helpful in relieving osteoarthritis-associated joint pain. Taking glucosamine may reduce the need for anti-inflammatory medications for some persons.
