Views Around The Lake

"Get your motor runnin', Head out on the highway,

Lookin' for adventure and whatever comes our way..." -from "Born to be Wild", 1968 recording by Steppenwolf.

I knew it was working on being a motorcycle-mania weekend somewhere...

On this particular Friday afternoon, from my wide-view window to the world facing 90A, I had already seen cycle after cycle zoom past, some in pairs, most in large groups.

Some easy riders with helmets, some without. Some toting a passenger or possible overnight pack, some just kicking back and riding on their own.

The clock was inching closer to 5 p.m., and I was ready to have one of those cycles pass through our circled drive and take me off to become a part of that passing bike brigade.

One can't help but notice a renewed interest in motorcycles these past few years.

Recent surveys credit baby boomers returning to the passions of their youth and the higher gas prices as major contributors to this trend.

Whatever the reason, just that same week I had passed two cycles parked near the road I travel to work with large "For Sale" signs temptingly displayed on them. Another sign in front of a business establishment read "Welcome Bikers," perhaps addressing the very group I had watched travel through Eagle Lake.

By the time I drove through town that late afternoon and

spied a cycle displayed in the front window of Tony's Tyler Studio, I knew it couldn't all be left to coincidence.

Besides, I was already maxed out on visions of leather, bandanas and boots and couldn't get Steppenwolf's tune out of my head.

Time to make a visit to the studio and check out Tony's new toy; but I should have been prepared to find the window display to be as much art as it is riding machine.

"It's a project that has been months in the making - a piece of art as well as an actual cycle to ride," Tyler explained to me.

On closer inspection I could see that what I had perceived to be an antique cycle of some type was indeed a work in progress, and the partially completed art project was part '68 Mercedes (rear insignia and front headlight) and part Harley Davidson (front wheel, circa 1939-49).

It had all begun with the frame from a dirt bike. Then came a rear tire from a riding mower and a chrome rear fender from a van. The handles are from a low rider bike and the precariously perched black leather seat may only be temporary.

"I'm still debating on what seat I want," Tyler admits, "and I'm considering a Harley gas tank and a 10 hp engine." His art-project/cycle-modification really began (at least mentally and spiritually) years ago when he owned his first cycle.

His later acquisition of a small cycle, rebuilt by him, only served to further pique his interest. Then followed his most recent purchase

(from an undisclosed source) of an '84 Honda Shadow.

"Cool ride," I said, trying to sound cool, as I viewed the Honda. (Is that the right lingo? "Easy Rider" was too many hard years ago, and I was simultaneously trying to recall if I had ever actually ridden tandem on a bike. I knew I never commandeered one.)

It turned out I didn't have to worry about sounding cool. It was then that Tyler confessed that his bike acquisitions were more about design than riding, though he does ride when he can and enjoys the open freedom of the experience.

A visitor to his studio can quickly catch his contagious enthusiasm, as he suggested different angles of viewing his cycle project and other art pieces, especially his sculptures.

Tyler the artist is into and will exhibit photography, sculpture and paintings, as well as art pieces such as his window-dis-


played motorcycle, September 15 through November 3, 2007, at his one-man art exhibition at Live Oak Art Center in Columbus.
