On defense, Weimar operates from an aggressive 'split-6' alignment.

Sweeps and leads are the hallmark of the Wildcat's running game.

to honor certain criteria that the public said was very important. These include groundwater use, land use and the possible loss of tax base," said Matthews. "As the process of trying to solve the Colorado River basin's problems moves forward, the Board will keep these issues at the forefront."

Board members expressed their appreciation to elected officials, advisory group members and residents for taking part in a six-year study of the proposed project's financial, technical and environmental impacts.

The resolution acknowledged that until this study period is completed, the Board cannot determine if the project will meet legal requirements adopted by the Texas Legislature in 2001 to make sure the project will protect and benefit the basin and its interests.

The Board also said that the proposed project will not begin until the study period is complete, required local, state and federal permits have been approved, and the project's potential long-term effects are better understood.

The Board specifically directed LCRA staff to:

- * Respect private landowners' property rights, offer fair compensation during land acquisition negotiations, and seek willing sellers to avoid using eminent domain except as a last resort.
- * Work with the San Antonio Water System (SAWS) to develop

recommendations to mitigate lost property tax revenues resulting from the project and avoid passing those costs on to LCRA, its customers or the basin's residents.

* Use groundwater developed for the project only when needed to meet water supply needs of customers of LCRA's irrigation districts. The Board noted that the sale of groundwater to cities outside LCRA's service area, including San Antonio, as a result of the project is not allowed by state law governing the project.

* Abide by the rules of local groundwater districts, limit the amount of groundwater used, and lease existing wells instead of owning or drilling wells when feasible.

* Continue to work closely with the basin's elected officials, stakeholders and residents to regularly inform them of the project's status and the study findings.

If it goes forward, the project would provide the funding needed to meet future water shortages for agriculture and rural communities in the lower Colorado River basin. The project also would help meet some of the shortages identified in the San Antonio area.

Water planning groups for both regions and the Texas Water Development Board have included the project as a key part of their long-term water plans. Major water suppliers in each region, LCRA and the San Antonio

Water System (SAWS), are studying the project and, if it goes forward, would implement it. SAWS would fund the project.

LCRA and SAWS have agreed that the project won't proceed after the study period if costs are too high, not enough water is available, or it does not meet the legal protections set by the Texas Legislature.

Gertson noted that the drought index figure is an average for the county and that parts of the county may be wetter or drier.

He also noted that it is possible to form a burn association to allow a group of farmers or ranchers to burn outdoors even if there is a burn ban in effect, provided proper precautions are taken.

Gertson said he understood such an organization was formed in Edwards County.

In other action, commissioners:

--Heard an update on the repair work to the district court ceiling at the courthouse, which partially collapsed in May. Jamison said that work is being done to determine the best way to anchor the ceiling.

Once that has been determined, he said, the repair project would be put out for bids. He estimated that could still be a couple of weeks away.

"I'm not happy at all with the progress being made," Jamison said at one point, indicating frustration with the pace of the repair effort.

--Heard that the name of Texana Mental Health-Mental Retardation Center had been changed to Texana Center to reflect a name change at the state level. He said services will remain the same.

--Approved a resolution recognizing Glidden Baptist Church's Centennial Celebration on Oct. 15.

--Approved a resolution honoring one of the church members, Lois Obenhaus Wallace, in recognition of her 100th birthday.

--Heard from residents of Oakridge Ranch, who are seeking paving of County Road 215.

An Oakridge Ranch resident, Ken Spector, presented commissioners with the results of a traffic survey, indicating approximately 1,000 vehicles a week, or 142 vehicles a day, use the road.

The group is seeking paving of about three miles of road. Commissioner Herbie Helmcamp, in whose precinct the road is located, said earlier he did not have the money in his budget to pave the road and repeated that again during the meeting.

--Approved spending \$7,500 to install 10 warning devices, sometimes called "panic buttons" in offices of the probation department.

--Approved a resolution to transfer ownership of the Alleyton Freshwater-Wastewater system to the Lower Colorado River Authority, which will operate the facility.




