tended Blinn College during the regular terms and WCJC during the summer. She went on to earn a bachelor's degree with a double major in biology and environmental science from Sam Houston State University. After a brief stint working at a Houston environmental lab, she earned a master's degree in biology from Texas Tech University. While there, she taught botany, biology and environmental science. In addition, she served as an Upward Bound science instructor, encouraging students from low-income families in their knowledge of science and in their higher education pursuits.

One of Jeffery's proudest accomplishments is being named by her peers as WCJC's fall 2005 recipient of the National Institute of Staff and Organizational Development (NISOD) Excellence Award. She is married to David Jeffery, Jr. They have a seven-year-old son and a four-year-old daughter.

Union Pacific Urges Halloween Safety

Year after year, on the last day of October, millions of children take to the streets dressing up in costume to go trick or treating. As the spooky holiday nears, Union Pacific urges motorists and pedestrians to use extra caution when traveling across railroad tracks and grade crossings, and to please stay away from railroad property.

"It's important to remind young children about the dangers of trains and trespassing on private property," said Bob Grimaila, senior assistant vice president-safety. "Adults should tell them to travel only on designated walkways, and to never take short cuts or play on or near railroad tracks."

Please use the following guidelines to keep your family safe this

Halloween:

-Trains cannot stop quickly. It can take a fully loaded freight train over a mile to stop.

-Know your rail signs and signals.

-Flashing red lights, with bells and gates, are used to close the road when a train approaches.

- Flashing red lights, with or without bells, warn of an approaching train.

- Remember that once one train passes, another train may well be coming behind it or from the opposite direction on another track.

- The crossbuck sign, the most common sign at public highway-

rail intersections, marks a crossing and should be considered the same as a YIELD sign. It has two crossed white boards with the words

RAILROAD CROSSING indicated.

- Most important, always expect a train.

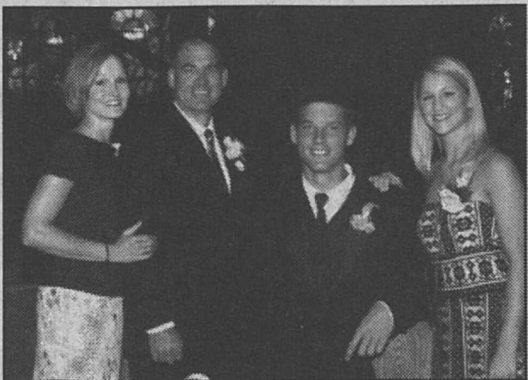
