Voters are reminded that they must show their voter registration certificate to the election judge, or, if they do not have their voter registration certificate, they must present the election judge with a valid form of identification before they can be qualified to vote.

An election judge can no longer swear to the identity of the voter.

In Colorado County, there are three local contested elections at the county level.

County Treasurer Diane Mat-us is facing challenger Deborah Herring.

There are also two contested

elections for peace justice.

In Precinct 2, which includes Weimar and Sheridan, justice of the peace candidates are Republican Richard Luhrs and Democrat W.O. Williamson. The incumbent, Ed Hanzelka Jr., did not seek re-election.

In Justice of the Peace Precinct 4, incumbent George Cason, a Democrat, is facing Dwight Hadley, a Republican.

Also, State Rep. Robby Cook of Eagle Lake, a Democrat, is facing Republican Tim Kleinschmidt and a Libertarian candidate, Roderick (Rod) Gibbs.

groundwater district.

Council voted unanimously to pass a resolution supporting the study.

Council also voted unanimously to support the creation of a groundwater district in order to protect the county's groundwater from the possibility of being pumped out of the county.

City Manager Ron Holland advised that there are many steps involved in getting this done, but maybe this would help get the ball rolling.

Council also had a discussion about cleaning up the city.

Doug Schwemm addressed council with a passionate speech about cleaning up Eagle Lake.

He said that he felt the city had good ordinances in place to aid in cleaning overgrown lots and junk.

He advised that the city needed to back up the ordinances with action to get something done.

"We need to say that we are not going to tolerate it any more," said Schwemm.

He said that the city must unite to get something done and that they need to ask for the cooperation of its citizens as well.

Holland said that many of the problem areas are a result of absentee owners or estates and that it is difficult to get something done in those situations.

He said that some of the areas the city could come in and clean up, but that there are just not enough resources to get the job done.

Council discussed the possibility of having a city-wide clean-up day where the city would pick up large items that the city normally does not dispose of.

"I don't think the problems we have here are unique to our city, I just think we have let them go too long," said Councilwoman Jane Meldahl.

"I think the city can at least address some of the smaller problem," said Mayor Mike Morales.

Council also discussed economic development a little later in the meeting.

Meldahl showed council a long-term economic development plan that had been generated by a committee several years ago.

Council agreed that a committee was needed to take a serious look at what needs to be done to help spur some development.

They also agreed that a plan to improve the city would only work with the help of everyone in the community.

"If we can get some people motivated, maybe we can get something done," said Meldahl.

In other council action:

-Council voted 3-2 in favor of allowing Police Lt. Wendy Alley to take her vehicle home.

The measure had been voted down at the previous council meeting.

Police Chief Bill Lattimore advised that Alley, like himself, is on call at all times.

He said that he felt allowing her to take the car home would make the likelihood of her staying on in Eagle Lake in the future more probable.

He advised that it is 17 miles from her home in Columbus and that for her it would be a considerable benefit for the amount of money it would cost the city.

A rough estimate of the cost was determined to be around \$1,300 for a year, based on approximate mileage and gas costs.

Councilman Chriss Schuirring made the motion to allow the car to be taken home and Councilman Dave Curry gave the motion

a second.

Curry, Schuirring and Meldahl voted in favor with Councilmen Larry Contreras and John Young against.

-Council heard from a woman, during public comments, who complained that the ditch in front of her house backs-up every time there is a hard rain and that she has to leave or get trapped inside her house until the water recedes.

She said that she was told by Holland that nothing could be done to remedy the situation there.

She said that he advised her that the cost to fix the problem was more than the city could afford.

Also during public comments, Clark Powers addressed council and said that he would be willing to remain on the Colorado County Central Appraisal District Board.

-Council voted to allow a parade permit for the Chamber of Commerce Christmas Parade scheduled for December 9.

-Council passed an ordinance to make the intersection of Warwick and Center Streets a four-way stop.

-Council agreed to submit an application for a grant for restoration of the City Hall and Post Office Complex.

Holland advised that the grant was through the Wintermann Foundation and that the foundation had approached the city about applying.

He said that some plans were drawn up several years ago to have this done and that the estimated cost then was about \$440,000.

Holland also advised that the grant would have a better chance of being approved if the city included a match, but that it was not required.

Council agreed to submit the application without a match because there are no funds for such a project.

If the city were to obtain the grant, the renovations would be done at no cost to the city.

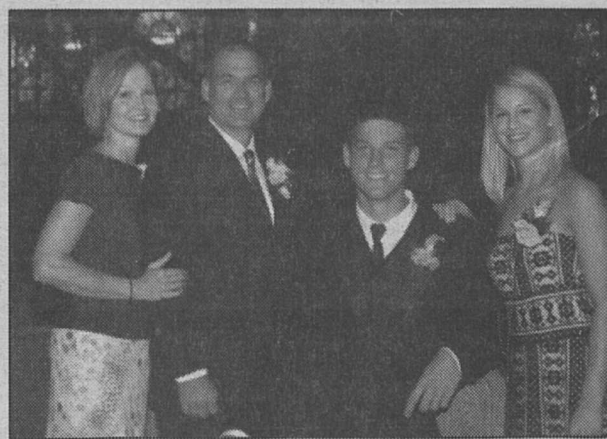
4-H Horse club to meet Nov. 21
