Four Civil Suits In District Court

Four civil suits were filed in Colorado County District Court in the last week.

On Nov. 8, LaSalle Bank Nation Association filed suit in a dispute over payments on a loan to Lillie B. Cunningham. The suit claims payments on the loan are in default and seeks an order of foreclosure for property at 412 Sixth Street in Eagle Lake.

On Nov. 9, Harvey Hayek filed suit against Randy Ray Roquemore and Peter Donohue in a dispute over a motor vehicle accident.

The suit says Hayek owns land

near the intersection of Texas 71 and FM 109 near Columbus. The suit states that on Feb. 20, Roquemore was driving a tractor-trailer truck for Donohue. The suit says the truck collided with another vehicle, overturned and spilled chemicals on Hayek's property.

An unspecified amount of damages is being sought.

THIRD IN A SERIES OF REPORTS ON THE LCRA-SAWS WATER PROJECT

Can Other Regions Use Water From the Lower Colorado River Basin?

Yes, under certain conditions. That's why it's more important now than ever before for LCRA and San Antonio Water System to partner in solutions for future water needs.

Transferring surface water from one basin or region to another can be done, but the interbasin transfer first must meet specific legal conditions and have a state water rights permit.¹

Surface water rights have been transferred from the lower Colorado River basin to other regions before (see map at right).

A potential conflict arose again in 2000 during the state's new regional water planning process. Region L said it will need more water to serve future growth in San Antonio, now the seventh largest city in the U.S. Region L identified a dozen ways to meet future shortages with groundwater and surface water from the lower Colorado River basin.²

Region K, which includes the lower Colorado River basin, immediately began seeking ways to respond to Region L's plan while protecting the Colorado River basin's water supplies. Region K and LCRA had a choice – to fight Region L's proposals to acquire water from the basin or work together to find a solution that would benefit both regions.

Taking part in a planning process early on is far more effective than reacting to decisions at the end. Based on past experience, the most sensible choice for LCRA and SAWS was to form a partnership to explore solutions for water needs in both regions. These discussions led to the proposed LCRA-SAWS Water Project.

WATER RIGHTS TRANSFERS TO OTHER REGIONS

O.H. Ivie Reservoir

The Colorado River Municipal Water District manages the upper Colorado River. In 1977, the district got a state water rights permit to build O.H. Ivie Reservoir to capture and store water that otherwise would flow into the Highland Lakes.

LCRA opposed the project and won a seven-year legal battle that ended at the Texas Supreme Court in 1984.³ But in 1985, the state's leadership directed LCRA to negotiate a water-sharing deal with the district so the new reservoir could be built. LCRA now shares water rights that enable the district to use up to 113,000 acre-feet* annually for the new reservoir.

Corpus Christi

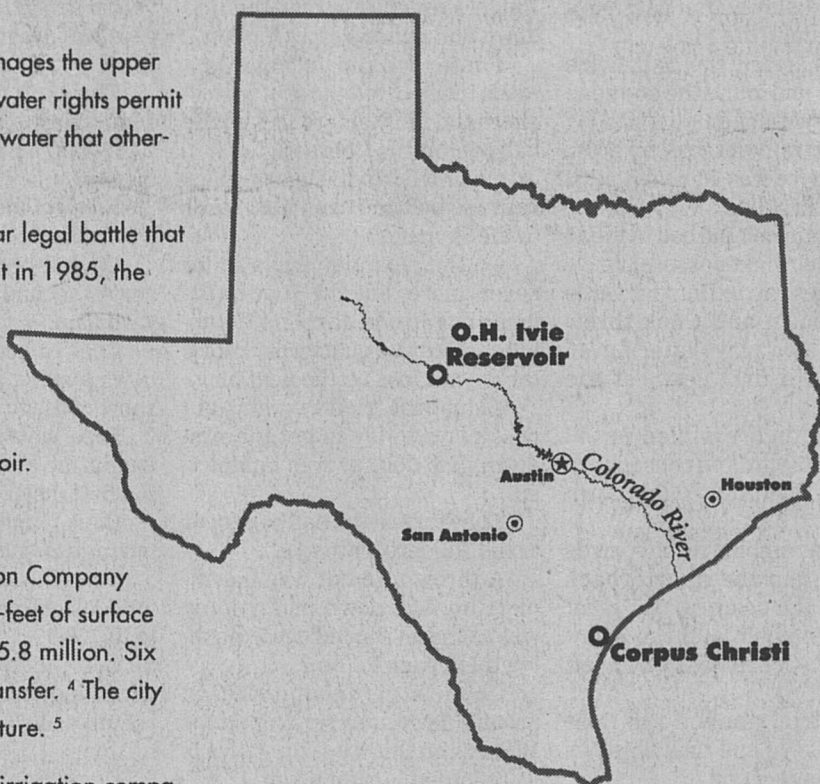
In 1992, the privately owned Garwood Irrigation Company in Colorado County agreed to sell 35,000 acre-feet of surface water rights to the City of Corpus Christi for \$15.8 million. Six years later, the state approved the interbasin transfer.⁴ The city has not used the water yet but plans to in the future.⁵

After the Corpus Christi deal, LCRA bought the irrigation company's remaining 133,000 acre-feet of water rights for \$75 million. The state approved the purchase in October 1998.⁶

* One acre-foot equals 325,851 gallons.
