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Raiders Finish Season With Loss To Hearne

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Two pass attempts fell incomplete and Luis Samaniego came on for a 35-yard field goal try.

Samaniego nailed the kick, making the score 14-11 in favor of Hearne with 7:55 left in the third quarter.

Hearne started their next possession at the 30, but fumbled on the first play and Lobpries recovered for the Raiders at the 28.

Rice would make them pay for the mistake a few plays later.

Cook threw complete to Toliver for seven yards and then Foster carried for six and two to the 13.

Cook then found Toliver open for a 13-yard touchdown strike.

Samaniego hit the extra point for an 18-14 Raider lead with 6:21 left in the third quarter.

Hearne started their next possession at the 36 and would drive the length of the field running the ball almost exclusively.

The only pass of the drive came on third-and-nine from the 37 and was completed for a 12-yard gain and a first down.

They ran the ball on the next eight plays including a 29-yard pickup on fourth-and-two from the 30-yard line to set up a one-yard quarterback keeper for a touchdown.

Williams intercepted a two-point try and the score was 20-18 in favor of Hearne with 1:23 left in the third quarter.

The Raiders started their next possession on the five-yard line after the kick returner was called down where he fielded the ball.

Lobpries ran the ball for eight yards followed by Foster with a 13-yard carry to the 26.

Cook kept the ball for a six-yard gain then threw complete on second down to Pratt for 22 yards to the 45.

The drive stalled there and Rice punted.

Hearne took over at the 20-yard line and on the first play fumbled on an option play. Jarrod Hemphill recovered the fumble for the Raiders and they took over at the 14-yard line.

The Raiders were not able to move the ball, however, and Samaniego was called on for another field goal attempt.

This time he hit from 25 yards and gave the Raiders a one-point lead, 21-20, with 9:06 left in the game.

Hearne started the next possession at the 42-yard line.

On first down, Danklefs and Damien Stevens stopped the

quarterback for a three-yard loss.

On the next play, Danklefs and Pratt stopped a rush attempt at the line of scrimmage.

The quarterback scrambled on the next play and picked up 13 yards to just get a first down at the Rice 48.

After a short gain and an incomplete pass, Hearne picked up nine yards on a screenplay to the 37.

A Hearne pass attempt was incomplete followed by a quarterback run for four yards.

On third down they completed a pass for 17 yards and a first down at the 16.

On the next play, the quarterback appeared to be tackled, but managed to get a pass off with a Raider defender pulling him down and it was caught at about the one-yard line where the receiver backpedaled into the end zone.

A pass attempt for two points fell incomplete and the Hearne retook the lead, 26-21, with 5:51 to play.

The Raiders got the ball at the 18 to start their next drive.

Cook ran the ball on first down for a 23-yard gain to the 41.

He carried on the next two plays for eight and nine yards and first down at the 42.

A run attempt was stopped behind the line for a seven-yard loss and the next play resulted in an incomplete pass.

On third down, Cook hit Lobpries for a 19-yard gain and a

Raider first down at the 30.

Cook ran twice for five and six yards and a first down at the 19.

A run attempt on first down was stopped for a five-yard loss.

The next three plays ended in incomplete passes and Rice turned the ball over on downs at the 24-yard line with under two minutes to play.

Hearne took over and kept the ball on the ground to run out the remainder of the clock and a preserve a 26-21 win.

Cook finished the night 9 of 19 for 130 yards and a touchdown. He also carried the ball for 80 yards.

Foster carried 22 times for 88 yards.

Toliver caught six passes for 76 yards and a touchdown.

Pratt had two receptions for 35 yards and Lobpries had one for 19.

Defensive standouts for Rice were:

Pratt, 10 tackles, 3 solo, incomplete; Danklefs, 10 tackles, 2 solo, sack; Stevens, 9 tackles, 1 solo, Suarez, 6 tackles, 1 solo, forced fumble; Brent Botard, 6 tackles, 1 solo, forced fumble; Williams, 5 tackles, 1 solo, 2 interceptions.

"Thanks to all the fans and supporters throughout the season. We couldn't have been successful without all of the great Raider fans," said Dumont.

"I look forward to next year, we have lots of young kids playing and our future here is bright," he added.

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Colorado County Tables Water District Talks

about a groundwater district.

In other recent developments, a private company has proposed to build a bottled water plant in the county and the Lower Colorado River Authority is discussing drilling irrigation wells to supply water for rice farmers.

During the commissioners' meeting, Travis Wegenhoft spoke in favor of a district.

Wegenhoft said that groundwater districts were the only method allowed by the state to manage and protect groundwater.

Laura Myres, also said that

she felt a water district would help control use of water and regulate water exportation. She said she is a landowner on Ramsey Road, which is near the proposed site of a bottled water plant.

Bob Pickens also said that there have been some changes in the past few years and said that the LCRA is looking at groundwater from Colorado County as a "potential vast source of water."

Commissioner Herbie Helm-camp said he saw a groundwater district as the only way to regulate water.

"We're just sitting here like

a bunch of ducks," he said of the present situation without a groundwater district.

In other action, commissioners:

-Approved on a 4-1 vote, a tax abatement plan for American PureTex Water Corporation for a proposed bottled water plant near the intersection of FM 102 and Ramsey Road, north of Eagle Lake.

The abatement provides for 100 percent the first two years, 75 percent the third year, 50 percent the fourth year and 25 percent the fifth year.

The company would pay taxes on the full value the sixth year.

The abatement sets out that PureTex will supply water to any landowner within 2,000 feet of a PureTex well if PureTex operations caused the landowner's well to go dry.

The company also agrees not to pump more than 1,650 acre-feet of ground water a year from the aquifer.

Land costs are not abated, only building values.

-Discussed briefly, but took no action of enacting a ban on outdoor burning.

equals 326,000 gallons.

If that rate were in effect when water sales start, LCRA would receive approximately \$18 million a year.

But Cullick cautioned that the current rate is based on LCRA's costs of managing water and could be higher or lower.

He also noted that LCRA is a non-profit agency, but said some of the money received could be earmarked for water conservation or development efforts.

Federal, state and local permitting processes will take place during the study period.

After the study period, the LCRA Board must find that the

project protects and benefits the basin as required by House Bill 1629, passed by the Texas Legislature in 2001. The SAWS Board must agree to the project's cost and available water supply.

Both LCRA and SAWS have agreed the project will not go forward if the study phase shows costs are too high, not enough water is available, or the project doesn't meet the legislative protections.
