## Cattle On Feed Down Eight Percent

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in Texas feedlots with capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 2.8 million head on February 1, down 8 percent from a year ago.

According to the monthly report released by the Texas Field Office, the estimate was down 2 percent from the January 1 level.

Producers placed 340,000 head in commercial feedlots during January, down 37 percent from a year ago, and down 8 percent from the December 2006 total.

Texas commercial feeders marketed 390,000 head during January, down 7 percent from

last year but up 1 percent from last month.

On February 1, there were 2.4 million head of cattle and calves on feed in the Northern High Plains, 84 percent of the state's total.

The number on feed across the area was down 7 percent from last year and down 2 percent from the January total.

January placements in the Northern High Plains totaled 299,000 head, down slightly from the December total.

Marketings were up 1 percent from last month to 321,000 head.

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the United

States in feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or more totaled 11.7 million head on February 1, 2007.

This inventory was 3 percent below February 1, 2006.

Placements in feedlots during January totaled 1.69 million head, 23 percent below January 2006.

January placements of cattle and calves weighing less than 600 pounds totaled 320,000 head; 600-699 pounds totaled 390,000 head; 700-799 pounds totaled 545,000 head; 800 pounds and greater totaled 435,000 head.

Marketings of fed cattle during January totaled 1.84 million head, 2 percent above 2006.

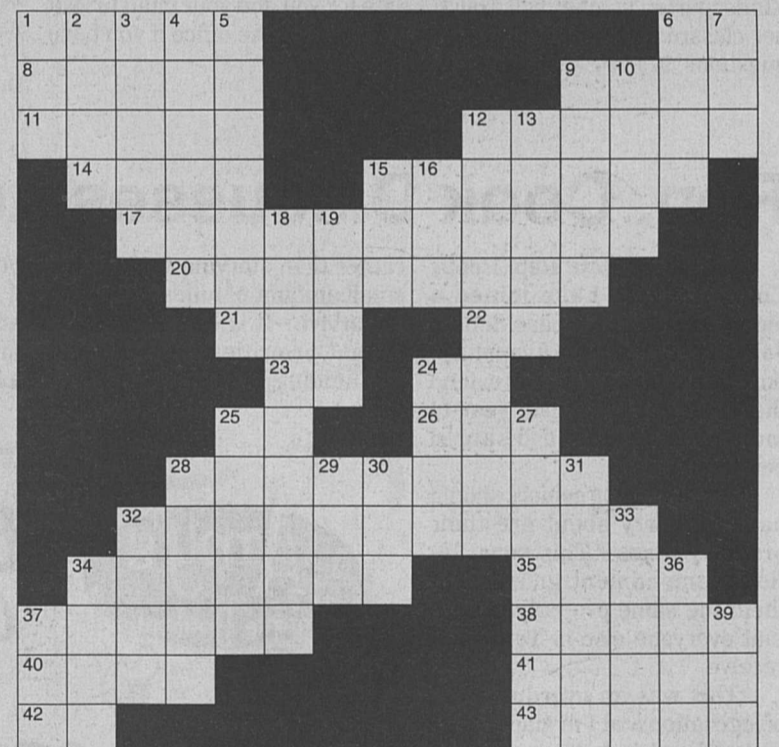
