New Exhibit At Live Oak Art Center

The plaster is drying, there is new plumbing and the downspouts are repaired so the Live Oak Art Center in Columbus, Texas will be opening its door for a new exhibit on March 10. The Live Oak Art Center has been closed for the months of January and February while the initial repairs were begun on their long awaited restoration. The repairs on the exterior brick will be ongoing. It only seems appropriate that the new exhibit at the Center involves architecture.

The Art Center will be hosting an exhibit of photography from the recently released book Historic Texas Courthouses. The photographs for the book were taken by Fayetteville artists Paul Hester and Lisa Hardaway. The exhibit also includes the sculpture of national recognized Texas clay artist, Mary Fischer. Mary incorporates the use of the house in her sculptures which explore the sense of place. The exhibit opens March 10 and runs through May 5.

In 1998, The National Trust for Historic Preservation placed over 200 historic Texas courthouses on its list of America's 11 Most Endangered Historic Places.

The Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program was started and now with hundreds of million dollars spent many of these buildings have been restored to their original grandeur. One hundred of these buildings are featured in Historic Texas Courthouses, by Mike Andrews, a former U.S. congressman from Texas. The stunning photographs by Paul Hester and Lisa Hardaway explore the clock towers, stately columns and stairways of these historic buildings. Forty of these images will be exhibited at the Live Oak Art Center, many not included in the book.

Paul Hester and Lisa Hardaway are a couple living and working in Fayetteville, Texas. Paul and Lisa both graduated from Rice University. Paul received his master's degree from Rhode

Island School of Design and Lisa completed her master's in music at Rice. After establishing careers in photography, they moved to Fayetteville to enjoy the benefits of rural living. Lisa moved here to plant as many roses as she could on two acres and raise a young son. Paul commutes to Rice to teach in the Visual Arts Department. They have been widely published in national magazines including Architectural Digest, Western Interiors and Texas Highways.

Paul and Lisa are currently working with the actress, Diane Keaton on a book exploring Spanish architecture in the Los Angeles area. They travel far and wide, sometimes in an Airstream trailer to photograph award winning architecture.

Mary Fischer's delicate clay sculptures also reflect the influence of architecture. Mary grew up in central Texas, where her German great-grandparents had settled to farm and raise their family. She earned a degree in history from North Texas State University and joined the Air Force to see more of the world. Her current work in clay seems to have roots in the architecture of those early Texas settlers as well as the handmade structures seen on her early travels.

For several years she worked as a map maker for an environmental consulting firm in Austin, and the graphic skills she acquired there found their way into the three dimensional space of her work as well as its surface decoration.

In her artist statement she says "The making of houses is

largely intuitive, but in order to get the "right" proportions, I sometimes make paper models. It is easier and quicker to make a piece out of paper and then use the model as a pattern to cut pieces out of clay. Building with extruded pieces is like playing with Legos."

The further influence of architecture can be noted in her statement, "The timelessness of indigenous, especially desert architecture is an abiding influence, as is the use of concrete by contemporary architects."

The Art Center is also sponsoring A Day of Art and Architecture on April 14.

The event will be a day of lectures, book signing and a delicious lunch by Greg Glueck of Top Shelf Catering. Joe Mashburn, Dean of the Gerald D. Hines College of Architecture, at the University of Houston will give the keynote speech. Paul Hester and Lisa Hardaway will give a gallery talk and be available for the book signing after lunch. Price for the event is \$20 and donations will go towards the LOAC Scholarship Fund. These funds are distributed once a year to an area high school student who is pursuing art in their college education. For more information call the Art Center at 979 732-8398.

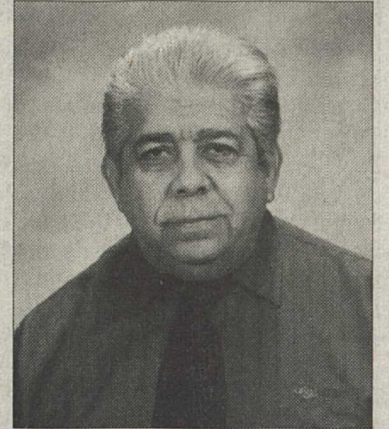


Adolfo Misael Martinez
