Everyday millions of people depend on the skill, expertise and commitment of public telecommunication professionals. They help save lives by answering emergency calls, dispatching emergency professionals and equipment and providing support to citizens in distress.

The term "9-1-1" is often associated with rapid emergency response poise under pressure, aid and compassion in times of distress and critical decision-making within seconds. Many

people don't stop to think about seemingly nameless, faceless individuals who answer 9-1-1 calls until they experience actual emergencies themselves.

Each year the second full week of April's dedicated to the men and women who serve as Public Safety Telecommunicators. The U.S. Congress passed a resolution recognizing the week, which has now become an annual event. And in 1996, President Bill Clinton proclaimed the second week of April as "National Telecommunicator's

Week".

April 8-14, we will be honoring the men and women of the Colorado County Sheriff's Office who perform telecommunication duties and serve as an indispensable link between our officers, the public and vital support services. Because they are the first line of contact for many of our residents they helped create the positive reputation and image our office enjoys.

Meal Planning Can Reduce Costs, Stress

More than half of the adults in the United States are overweight or obese. Many children are also overweight says Sally Garrett, County Extension Agent "Family & Consumer Sciences. One possible cause is that many American do not understand and/or follow the guidelines for choosing healthful foods to meet their physical needs.

When we don't plan meals effectively "or any at all" our diet quality often suffers. The temptation to go out for a quick burger and fries or pizza can be difficult to overcome and may result in a meal that is more expensive than a dinner cooked at home.

Meal planning may take some time initially, but it saves time in the long run, and it often gets easier with practice. The U.S.

Department of Agriculture's new food guide pyramid, called MyPyramid, can be used to plan healthy meals.

Planning meals will help people save money, make their diets more healthful and reduce stress at dinner time.

The are six steps to successful meal planning:

Plan a menu based on MyPyramid.

Write a shopping list.

Shop for the best food buys.

Store and prepare food properly to prevent food spoilage and avoid foodborne illness.

Serve appropriate and healthful food portions.

Enjoy your dinner.
