Perry Vetoes Eminent Domain Bill

Farmers, ranchers and other property owners across Texas are reacting with disbelief following Governor Rick Perry's veto of eminent domain legislation that would have provided fairness and compensation when private property is taken for public use.

"Governor Perry should have made it his priority to protect private property rights," said Colorado County Farm Bureau President Marv Ulbricht. "HB 2006 recognized that property owners should be treated with respect."

HB 2006, authored Rep. Beverly Woolley of Houston and sponsored in the Senate by Houston Sen. Kyle Janek, passed the Texas House with 125 to 150 votes. The Senate passed it unanimously. The eminent domain bill proposed that property owners be treated fairly when their property is taken.

"Governor Perry's veto of the eminent domain legislation goes completely against what he has claimed over the years, that is he is an advocate for property rights," Ulbricht said. "Early in

this session of the Legislature, he met with agricultural producers and agreed with them the state's eminent domain process needed to be reformed.

Farmers and ranchers are deeply disappointed with Governor Perry's decision to veto HB 2006."

With the projected population growth in Texas, takings will occur much more frequently for roads, reservoirs and other public needs in rural, suburban and urban areas of the state.

Blinn Police Academy Deadline Near

The deadline for application to the police academy for Fall 2007 at Blinn College is July 31 with the 17-week academy beginning on Aug. 13.

The academy is a partnership between Blinn and the Texas Engineering Extension Service to give students both college credit and hands-on experience.

This fall is the first time students attending the academy are eligible for college credit and financial aid.

Blinn added the academy to its curriculum for the Associate in Applied Science in Criminal Justice.

One of the four semesters in the two-year program is spent at the Central Texas Police Acad-

emy that includes access to a firing range, driving track, and residential prop houses that provide realistic scenarios.

The academy is also a component of the one-year law enforcement certificate. Participants in the Spring 2007 academy had a 100% pass rate on the state exam, said TEEX program manager Cullen Grissom.

The criminal justice degree and certificate are available on Blinn's Brenham and Bryan campuses. The police academy is located at Texas A&M University's Riverside Campus in western Brazos County.

The academy costs \$4,200. The other semesters are charged on the regular Blinn tuition and fee

schedule.

Financial aid is available as another advantage to attending the police academy for college credit.

Recognized as the oldest statewide law enforcement extension training agency in Texas, TEEX's Central Texas Police Academy has been preparing future officers for successful careers in law enforcement since the 1940s.

Graduates have a long-standing record of a 99-percent passing rate on the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education (TCLEOSE) licensing examination and are recruited by law enforcement agencies throughout the state.

Naturalist Class Set For September

The Gideon Lincecum Chapter of Texas Master Naturalist, which includes Austin, Colorado, Fayette, and Washington counties, will begin a new training class on September 17, which will finish on December 8, 2007.

Classes will be held at Fayette Heritage Library/Museum in La Grange on Monday evenings, from 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. Field trips

will be in various locations on some Saturday mornings.

The Texas Master Naturalist program, with 27 chapters across the state, aims to develop a group of well-informed volunteers who will work toward the restoration and conservation of native wildlife and habitat through education, outreach, and service projects.

The program is sponsored by Texas Parks and Wildlife and the

Texas Cooperative Extension.

Fourth hours of classes and 40 hours of volunteer work are required to become a certified Texas Master Naturalist.
