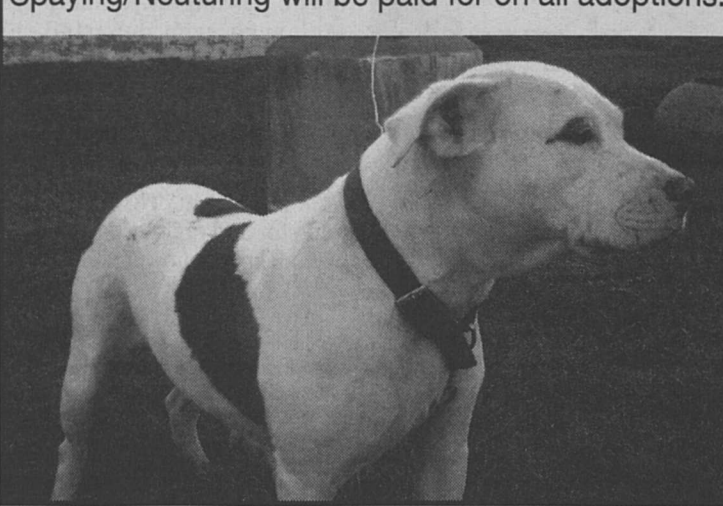

## Adult Immunization Information

Adult Immunizations  
Remember getting ready for the first day of school? The new clothes.

The new supplies. The SHOTS! Maybe immunizations weren't the highlight of your back-to-school experience but they were necessary says Sally Garrett, County Extension Agent - Family & Consumer Sciences.

Try to remember the last time you were immunized B it has probably been a while.

Andrew B. Crocker B Texas Cooperative Extension Specialist - Gerontology Health states the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services along with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have some tips for adult immunizations.

Pneumonia and influenza together represent the fifth leading cause of death in older adults. These two conditions may be prevented by receiving an influenza vaccination and pneumococcal vaccination.

The pneumococcal vaccination requires a one time injection, says Crocker. The influenza vaccine requires an injection once per year due to the changing nature of the influenza virus.

Medicare Part AB@ provides for you to receive these two vaccinations: once for pneumococcal

and annually for influenza.

Fifty or fewer cases of tetanus occur each year, but result in five deaths annually in the U.S. Most of these deaths occur in adults over the age of 60. In addition, nearly one out of every 10 people who get diphtheria will die from it. For these reasons, the CDC recommends that adults receive a Tetanus/Diphtheria booster once every 10 years.

Another common vaccination is for measles, mumps and rubella (MMR), states Crocker. MMR is normally administered once and offers protection for life.

Unimmunized persons of any age can get measles, mumps or rubella, but those born after 1956 that do not have proof of immunity are particularly at risk and should be immunized.

There are certain immunizations that may benefit you if your lifestyle or job put you at risk.

Vaccinations for Hepatitis AA@ and AB,@ Varicella (Chicken Pox) and Meningitis may benefit certain individuals.

High risk individuals for these conditions include health workers, immunosuppressed persons and those who live with or have close contact with infected persons.

Frequent travelers may need specific immunizations. These persons should check the CDC website for vaccination and medication recommendations for various travel destinations.

That information may be accessed at <http://www.cdc.gov/travel>.

It is estimated that each year in the U.S. about 50,000 adults die from vaccine-preventable diseases or their complications, says Crocker.

Talk with your health provider about updating your immunization record.

## A Groundwater Conservation District for Colorado County

FACT	MYTH
We have the right to reconsider a GCD, and to vote again. Groundwater protection becomes more important everyday as we face increasing pressure from population and industry growth.	We voted on this twice before, we should not ever have to vote on this again.
Most citizens of our county respect our neighbors, even if we disagree. We are willing to listen to each other, and formulate our own opinions.	Every election on this issue further divides our community. It pits neighbor against neighbor, church member against church member.
The State of Texas wants groundwater to be managed on a local basis. The GCD is the State approved management tool. Our GCD rules are written by our directors (local citizens), elected by you.	The State will make the rules of the district. We will not have any say in the rules. Outsiders will take control of the GCD and make our rules.
The GCD does not want your water. The purpose of a GCD is to conserve and protect groundwater, and to prevent waste and degradation of water quality. The GCD also collects data, necessary for future groundwater preservation.	The GCD wants to take control of your groundwater and sell it to water marketers. The GCD is just another layer of government.
The state of Texas honors a landowners' right to harvest and sell his groundwater (just as he can sell gravel, oil, gas, and timber). Some states do have a "reasonable use" clause, but the state may own the water, both surface and groundwater.	Texas should change the law to reasonable use like other states. The best way to protect our groundwater is for our legislature to adopt the reasonable use clause. All but six states, including Texas have such legislation. This is simple.
A GCD does not have the right to stop the export of water, because Texas law allows resources to be sold and transported. A GCD can set limits on the amounts transported.	The GCD can stop the export of water, and they should. They refused to write a rule to stop water from being taken out of our county.
Groundwater wells operated by LCRA must adhere to the rules of our GCD.	LCRA gains control of our groundwater through a GCD.
The GCD will be paid for with property tax of \$0.03 per \$100 of valuation (maximum), or \$30 for \$100,000 of value. Cost estimates project \$0.02 or less on every \$100 to run the GCD. The GCD cannot sell your water. Board members are volunteers, and are not paid a salary.	The district will sell as much of your water as they possibly can in order to make more money for the benefit of a few people.
