Relief From Poison Ivy, Oak and Sumac

Poison ivy, oak, and sumac are toxic plants that may lead to contact dermatitis in susceptible individuals. *Urushiol* is the chemical substance contained in these plants that is responsible for causing the skin irritation. It causes a typical red, itchy rash. Swelling and blisters may be present. Once exposed to urushiol, a reaction will typically develop within 12 to 48 hours. Poison ivy and poison oak typically grow 3 leaflets to a stem. Sumac typically has 2 rows of leaflets on each stem. A skin reaction may occur as a result of touching the toxic plant, coming into contact with an object that has come into contact with the plant (such as a jacket), or inhaling the smoke from burned toxic plants. Although the rash is not contagious, urushiol may be transmitted from person to person, thereby inducing a reaction.

Although the rash caused by poison ivy, oak, or sumac will typically resolve without treatment within 1 to 3 weeks, treatments are available for the alleviation of associated signs and symptoms. Medications available over-the-counter include *hydrocortisone cream*, *calamine lotion*, and *diphenhydramine* (Benadryl). Cold, wet compresses also may be used for 15 to 30 minutes several times daily. An oral steroid, such as *prednisone*, may be prescribed for more severe reactions.

Texas Crop Weather Report

The Texas Field Office released the following report regarding the state's agriculture during the past week.

Many areas of the state experienced very dry conditions accompanied by high winds.

East Texas received up to 2 inches in some areas, while the rest of the state received very little or no rain.

Wheat harvest progressed in the Panhandle, while wheat harvest neared completion in most of the Blacklands.

Hot and dry weather plus high winds stressed some of the cotton.

Irrigation of corn continued in the Northern High Plains as well as part of South Central Texas. Preparation for sorghum harvest began in the Lower Valley.

Peanut planting neared completion in most areas of the state.

However, there were a couple reports of replanting due to the high winds.

Blueberries were harvested in North East Texas. Onion, potato and cabbage harvest continued in South Texas, and onions continued to be harvested in the Trans-Pecos.

Due to the very little rainfall and above normal temperatures, crops and livestock were stressed in parts of the state.

Topsoil moisture was mostly very short to short statewide.

Field Crops Report

Wheat harvest progressed in the Panhandle, while wheat harvest neared completion in most of the Blacklands.

Wheat condition was mostly poor to fair statewide.

Oat condition was mostly fair to good statewide.

Cotton
Hot and dry weather plus high winds stressed some of the cotton.

Hail damage was reported by a couple of producers in the Northern High Plains.

Cotton condition was mostly fair to good statewide.

Corn
Irrigation of corn continued in the Northern High Plains as well as part of South Central Texas.

Corn condition was mostly fair to good statewide.

Sorghum
Preparation for sorghum harvest began in the Lower Valley.

Sorghum condition was mostly fair to good statewide.

Peanuts
Peanut planting neared completion in most areas of the state; however, there were a couple reports of replanting due to the high winds.

Peanut condition was mostly fair to good statewide.

Rice
Rice condition was mostly fair to good statewide.

Soybeans
Soybean condition was mostly fair to good statewide.

Fruit, Vegetable and Specialty Crop Report
Blueberries were harvested in North East Texas, onion, potato, and cabbage harvest continued in South Texas, and onions continued to be harvested in the Trans-Pecos.

Livestock, Pasture and Range Report
Due to the very little rainfall and above normal temperatures, crops and livestock were stressed in parts of the state.

Supplemental feeding of livestock continued in South Central Texas and range and pasture condition was mostly fair to good statewide.

Ag Market Recap For Week Ending June 14

For the week ending June 14, 2008, feeder cattle prices at Texas auctions were mostly \$2 to \$5 per hundredweight lower under pressure from higher grain prices.

Fed cattle prices declined \$1 per hundredweight.

Cotton and grain prices were sharply higher.

Ongoing concerns about the wet weather and flooding in the Midwest caused corn prices to rise and helped pull wheat and grain sorghum markets higher.

Cotton prices rose after USDA reduced its estimate of stocks remaining at the end of this marketing year.

As for futures markets, finished cattle, cotton, wheat and corn closed the week higher, while feeder cattle and lumber were lower.

Weather during the week was hot, dry and windy for most of the state, though some locations in East Texas reported as much as 2 inches of rain.

Topsoil moisture was rated mostly short to very short statewide.

The dry weather stressed crops with most acreage reported in good to fair condition.

Wheat harvest is 51 percent complete, slightly ahead of the average pace.

Cotton planting stands at 94 percent complete, slightly ahead of average.

The corn crop is 51 percent tasseled compared to the 57 percent average by this date.

Did You Know?

The United States National Park Service was established in 1916 by then-President Woodrow Wilson.

Though the Park Service was established, the first National Park actually preceded the Park Service by almost 50 years, as President Ulysses S. Grant named Yellowstone Park the first national park in 1872.

Since then, the park system

has come a long way, as today it comprises 391 areas covering more than 84 million acres. That includes parks in the District of Columbia, American Samoa, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. The largest park in the system is Alaska's Wrangell-St. Elias National Park & Preserve, which includes nine of the 16 highest peaks in the United States.
