Following a honeymoon in Costa Rica, the couple will reside in Houston.

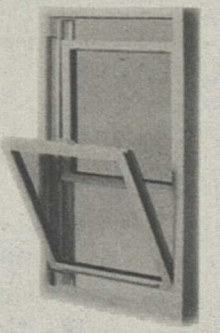

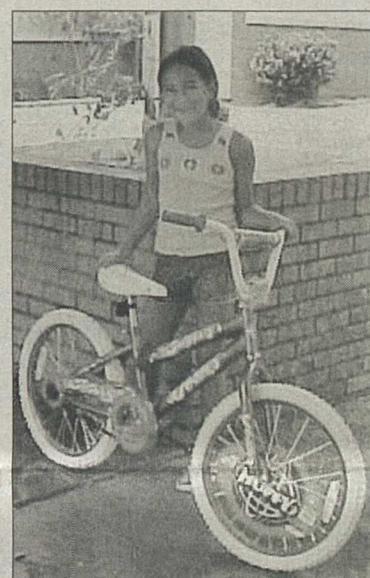

Harbich On Tex. State Dean's List

Texas State University-San Marcos announced that Angela D. Harbich of Alleyton earned "Dean's List" recognition for excellent academic performance for the Spring 2008 Semester.

Texas State students must complete 12 semester hours and earn a minimum GPA of 3.5 to be recognized for the "Dean's List".

Roadcheck Inspects Over 5,000 Vehicles

During Roadcheck 2008, which ran from June 3 through June 5, DPS troopers inspected 5,824 commercial vehicles, placing 24.6 percent of them out of service for equipment violations.

During the three-day campaign, 5,824 commercial vehicles were inspected, and 1,435 of the vehicles and 178 of the drivers were found to have serious enough safety violations to be removed from service.

Last year, 1,659 vehicles and 259 drivers were placed out of service.

Inspectors placed 122 drivers out of service for hours-of-service violations.

Thirteen drivers were placed out of service for drug or alcohol violations. Troopers issued 11 tickets for seatbelt violations.

Vehicle out-of-service violations included 911 trucks that needed a brake adjustment, 564 that had brake system problems, 173 that had tire or wheel

problems and 251 that had light malfunctions.

DPS Commercial Vehicle Enforcement troopers, along with Highway Patrol troopers and other inspectors who have received specialized training in commercial vehicle inspection, stopped commercial vehicles to inspect safety equipment and check driver licenses, endorsements and log books.

Troopers also looked for possible drug or alcohol use.

The Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance, which sponsors Roadcheck, reports a significant decrease in the commercial vehicle crash rate in North America since the program's start in 1988.

Vehicles passing inspection received a CVSA decal exempting the vehicle for inspection for a 90-day period, unless they have an obvious safety defect.

Troopers issued 2,054 decals during Roadcheck 2008.

SPILL-PROOF CUPS

Most parents are aware of the damage to the teeth caused by putting a child to sleep with a bottle of milk or other sweetened beverage. Now, a recent study suggest that the prolonged use of spill-proof cups with bill-shaped extension can be just as damaging as a bottle.

This damage is caused by milk or other carbohydrate containing liquids staying on the teeth and allowing bacteria that are normally present in the mouth to attack the teeth by forming "plaque acids." These acids create holes in the teeth (cavities) and can lead to deep infections of the tiny nerves within them. The susceptibility to cavities is also increased because of the flow of protective saliva is greatly reduced during sleep.

If your child must use a bottle or spill-proof cup at bedtime, substitute water or something unsweetened, or use a pacifier.

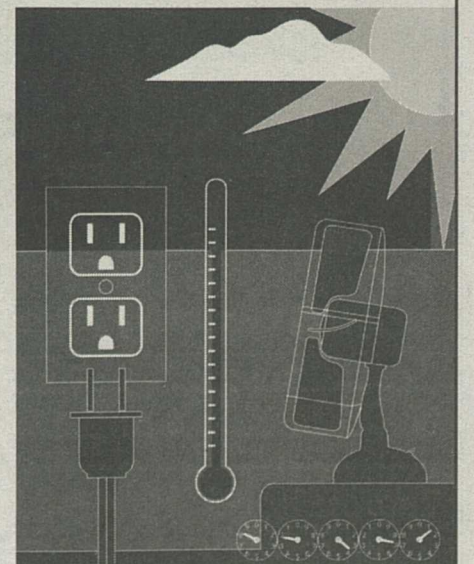
