Texas Main Street Program Gets Funding

The Texas Historical Commission's (THC) Texas Main Street Program was honored yesterday by receiving a \$218,615 grant from Preserve America to enable strategic reassessments of Main Street cities throughout the state. The grant will be utilized over the next two years to conduct site visits to participating communities to enhance their existing preservation ethic that has developed under the national Main Street model.

Twenty-nine Texas Main Street/Preserve America communities are eligible for funding. Preserve America is a White House initiative that encourages and supports community efforts to preserve and enjoy priceless cultural and natural heritage.

"Preserve America Grants help communities learn about their history and share it with visitors. These grants make the story of America come alive and create a better understanding of our diverse and rich cultures," said John L. Nau, III, chairman of the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation.

The reassessment visits will be condensed versions of the original resource teams that are provided to all new Texas Main Street cities. The assessments will include direct recommendations and suggestions for specific historic resources in local Main Street districts.

The grant will also fund regional training and education for the public through a series of informational presentations in Texas Main Street Program/Preserve America communities on crucial preservation topics including historic building maintenance, heritage tourism initiatives, tax incentives and design guidelines.

The ultimate goal of these

objectives is to increase statewide awareness and understanding of sound preservation practices as they relate to historic resources and heritage tourism.

"We appreciate Preserve America's recognition and support of our Main Street Program in Texas," said THC Main Street Coordinator Debra Farst. "Main Street communities help bring Texas history to life, enriching not only residents but visitors lives by cultivating and promoting the Texas mystique that thrives in these historic towns."

The THC's Texas Main Street Program is a revitalization program for historic downtown and neighborhood commercial districts. It is based on the national program's Four-Point® approach

Historical Marker Deadline Approaching

Beginning Oct. 15, the Texas Historical Commission (THC) will be accepting applications for 2009 Official Texas Historical Markers via email (markerapplication@thc.state.tx.us) through Jan. 15, 2009. The new application forms are available on the THC web site under the Markers and Designations section at www.thc.state.tx.us.

Potential sponsors interested in applying for a marker should first meet with their county historical commission (CHC) for assistance compiling their application and for guidance on local procedures and reviews. The upcoming cycle brings several notable web site additions and application changes, including:

Since its inception in 1981, the Texas Main Street Program has worked with more than 140 cities across the state.

The program has stimulated more than \$1.3 billion in private sector downtown reinvestment; helped retain, expand or recruit more than 6,000 businesses, and created more than 23,000 new jobs in Texas.
