Texas Ranger To Speak At Nesbitt

Joaquin Jackson, who served in the Texas Rangers for about thirty years and has written two books about his experiences, will discuss his books at the Nesbitt Memorial Library in Columbus on Tuesday, Oct. 21.

In 1994, Jackson, who had only just retired from the service, was one of the rangers featured in an article in Texas Monthly.

A photograph of him, looking menacing holding a rifle, appeared on the cover. The cover was made into a poster, which sold well.

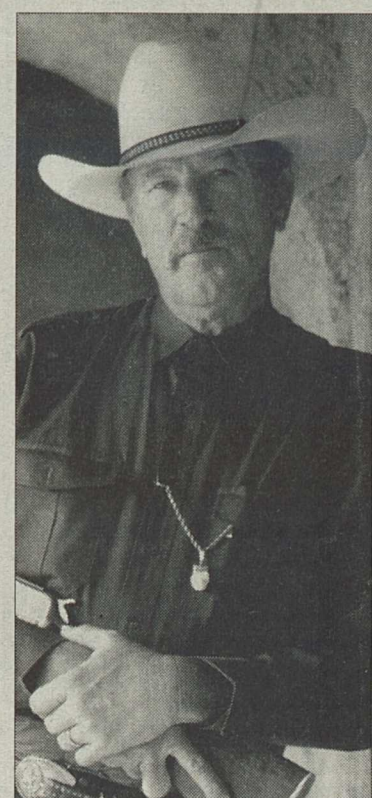
Suddenly something of a celebrity, Jackson was encouraged to write a book. His early attempts to work with national publishers failed.

Then, The University of Texas Press came on board. His first memoir, called One Ranger and published in 2005, shortly became the bestselling book in the history of the press, and was optioned for a movie. And so, Jackson wrote a second book, which was published earlier this year under the title One Ranger Returns.

Both books discuss Jackson's many adventures in the ranger service, some involving gunfire. There is also much information about the daily life of a late twentieth century ranger, and a good bit about various investigations. Some of the cases are famous, some obscure.

Included are stories of the prison riot shoot out at Carrizo Springs, the senseless murder of canoeists on the Rio Grande at Big Bend National Park by Mexican nationals, the infamous United Farm Workers strike in the Rio Grande Valley in 1966-1967, Jackson's encounters with serial killers Henry Lee Lucas and Otis Toole, and his attempt to solve a cold case, the 1938 murders of a mother and her daughter in the desert near Van Horn.

Copies of the books will be available for purchase and autographing. The event begins at 7:00. It is sponsored by the Friends of the Nesbitt Memorial Library, and is free and open to the public. Proceeds from the sale of books will benefit the library.

Habitat Plans Two New Houses

Board President Scott Mattingly recently announced that Colorado County Habitat for Humanity will begin construction on two new houses - one in Alleyton and one in Eagle Lake. "In the past we have built one house a year.

So building two houses simultaneously will be a challenge for us. However, the Board feels that, with the support of the community, we are up to the challenge."

Several activities are planned in October to kick-off the building campaign. On October 19, there will be a county-wide Sign-A-Stud for Habitat campaign at all area churches to raise funds for the construction.

After church services, citizens will have an opportunity to make a cash donation and then sign a 2 X 4 stud, or board. The boards will be used in the framing of the

houses.
On October 23, CCHFH will sponsor two informational meetings at the Wintermann Library in Eagle Lake.

At 5:30 p.m., individuals interested in volunteering with Habitat are invited to learn about the behind-the-scene activities that support the house construction.

Volunteers are always needed to swing a hammer or paint brush, but volunteers are also needed to find available land and/or lots, select and support the partner families, work with the community to raise funds, and provide administrative support in the office. This event will give people a chance to learn how they can help.

At 7 p.m. on October 23, another meeting will be held for potential homeowners. This meeting will focus on the family selection criteria, the application and con-

struction processes, and future build plans. Individuals and families interested in learning about Habitat are encouraged to attend the meeting.

Colorado County Habitat for Humanity is a non-profit, ecumenical housing ministry. The Affiliate works in partnership with families-in-need and the community to build simple, affordable housing within Colorado County.

CCHFH Board Meetings are held on the second Tuesday of each month at 6:30 p.m. at Youth and Family Services, 1336 Fannin in Columbus. Guests are always welcome at the meetings.
