ing and guided excursions to ancient rock art sites.

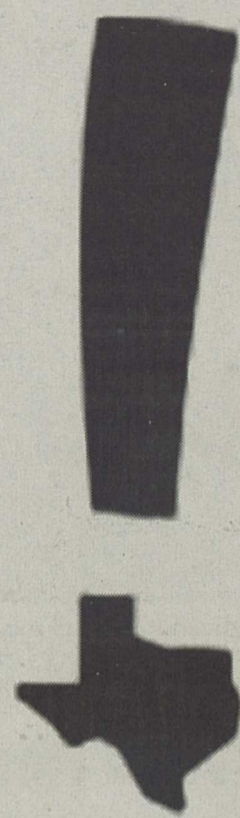
There are three age divisions for the Food Show: Senior - ages 14 and up, Intermediate - ages 11 - 14, and Junior, ages 8 - 11.
