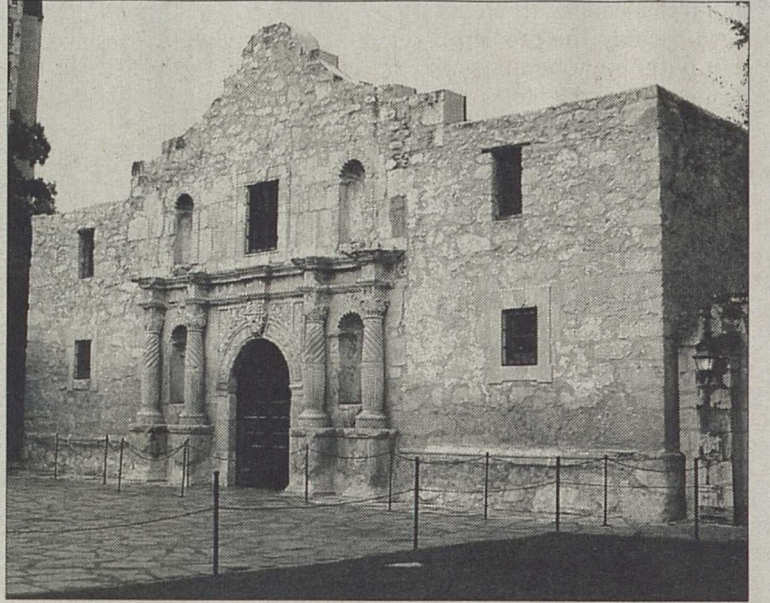
Featuring more than 150 photographs, the exhibit traces the history of the Alamo as Mission,

Texas Lutheran University will present the comedic drama "Sueño" by José Rivera, Oct. 24-26, in TLU's Jackson Auditorium. Performances begin at 2:30 p.m. on Friday and Sunday and at 7:30 p.m., Friday and Saturday. Tickets, which are \$10 for adults and \$5 for seniors and students, are available at the TLU Bookstore and at the door.

The cast includes performances by TLU students Eddie Gomez, San Antonio; Chad Byrd, New Braunfels; Danny Flink,

Sueño is a modern adaptation of Pedro Calderón de la Barca's classic Life is a Dream. The play follows the life of Segismundo, heir to the Spanish throne, imprisoned at birth when astrologers predicted his reign would ruin the country. With King Basilio's reign ending, he releases Segismundo and places him on the throne. If gentle and civilized, Segismundo will be allowed to reign. If wild and barbaric, he'll be sent back

to his imprisonment and told that his brief moment of freedom and power was only a dream. Sueño asks the eternal questions posed by Calderón: What is man—angel or animal? What is honor? What is freedom? If life is a dream, who is dreaming us, and what is real?

"Sueño" by José Rivera was originally commissioned and produced by the Hartford Stage Company of Hartford, Conn.

LCRA Works To Increase Land Productivity

Landowners in the Colorado River watershed can now receive up to \$20,000 in grant funding to help pay for conservation measures designed to reduce soil erosion and improve land productivity, such as removing brush and restoring native vegetation.

The goal of LCRA's Creekside Conservation Program is to provide landowners an incentive to combat soil erosion and implement conservation practices to reduce the buildup of sediment in area waterways.

Bastrop, Fayette, Colorado, Wharton and Matagorda counties are included in this program.

Landowners can receive financial assistance for projects such as managing brush, installing cross fencing and grade stabilization structures and other practices that help combat soil erosion, which decreases land productivity and can degrade water. They may receive up to 50

percent of the cost of the project, not to exceed \$20,000.

"Implementing these conservation activities can help landowners improve the productivity of their farms and ranches, plus protect the area's water quality," said Lee Fritsch, LCRA Conservation Services coordinator.

LCRA and local soil and conservation districts administer the program by tapping a grant program under the federal Clean Water Act designed to control nonpoint-source water pollution caused by rainwater runoff. As a steward of the area's natural resources, including the lower Colorado River and its tributaries, LCRA has worked with local agencies and landowners for many years to address the soil erosion problem.

Waterways may suffer from sedimentation and nonpoint-source pollution. This sediment can build up to create flood man-

agement problems, threaten aquatic habitats, impair water quality and reduce groundwater recharge.

The program is funded by a three-year, \$486,000 grant LCRA received in 2007 from the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. The funding supports LCRA's Creekside Conservation Program, an 18-year-old effort to help farmers and ranchers in Central Texas reduce soil erosion. Along with additional in-kind contributions from LCRA and area landowners, more than \$1 million will be available to help implement conservation practices on private lands.
