yesterday. Brittany and Jessica entered to begin helping, and they were also assisting yesterday at the race competition.

I allow the girls to complete their kitchen assignments as I tour the remainder of the building. There is a large, spacious pantry with essential fare for hungry youth.

Two volunteers are working at a computer as I view and appreciate some very good photographs of children, displayed intermittently on the walls with a busy-looking November calendar page, some good quotes from good scripture and a prominent copy of the Ten Commandments. Yes, this is truly a "lighthouse."

It's outdoors I survey the premises and find additional buildings containing a chat room, math lab, library room, resource room, reading lab and multi-purpose and meeting rooms. "The Creator's House," an art house, stands nearby and the lovely-decorated door with stained-glass-effect beckons me inside to

see lots of displayed art and lots of paints and papers and artistic workspace.

I could stay and enjoy this environment for a while, but become interested in robust shouts from behind the building.

The noise, I discover, is coming from ten boys shooting happily around three hoops at a very efficient make-shift basketball court. It's outdoors and the late afternoon is getting cooler, but I know the vigorous enthusiasm will continue till near dark.

It's only as I slip past the basketball players and still-busy cooking class, returning to my car, that I first notice a white wooden replica of a lighthouse sitting just at the corner of the main building.

A remnant from a past parade float, I later learn, someone had chosen to erect this structure to symbolize the name, and subsequent true definition, of the Lighthouse.

It's leaning just a bit to one side and at the top, where a beacon should be placed, is just

a wood-trimmed opening, causing the structure to appear a bit weather-beaten, but still look very much like the strong house of light that stands at important ports and points, offering safety, guidance and security to those in need.

Don't be deceived by the missing beacon: Spend a little of your time at Eagle Lake's Lighthouse and you will soon find that a light indeed shines there.

in the monthly premium for Medicare Part "B," the optional outpatient health insurance. The standard Medicare Part B monthly premium will be \$96.40 in 2009. Additionally, the \$135 annual deductible for services for 2009 is unchanged from 2008.

The 2009 open enrollment period for a person to enroll in or

change a Medicare prescription drug plan begins on 15 November and ends on 31 December, 2008. Any and all changes made will go into effect 01 January 2009. Each beneficiary should compare the changes in cost and drug coverage that will take place in 2009 to their current prescription drug plan. Beneficiaries should then compare this to the costs and

coverage of other plans that will be offered in their community - checking to see 1) the costs of these plans, 2) the medicines and services they cover, and 3) how it works with their pharmacies and doctors. Each beneficiary needs to choose the best plan that meets their prescription drug needs and then enroll in this plan.

Conditions and costs of each plan will vary by provider and by the plan type. Some plans offer additional help and some beneficiaries will qualify for extra assistance based on income. To find out the specifics for each plan, consult the plan provider directly. In 2009, monthly premiums will average \$30 and beneficiaries must meet the \$295 annual deductible before the Part "D" plan begins paying, unless that particular plan has some exception. Coverage will continue with the beneficiary paying just the co-payment and any residual cost for prescription drugs until the amount paid by the plan and the beneficiary reaches \$2,700. At that point, the beneficiary will be responsible for 100% of drug costs until \$4,350 is reached unless the particular plan has some exceptions for coverage during this gap period. Once the beneficiary has spent more than \$4,350, coverage resumes under the plan.

According to CMS, some Part "D" beneficiaries may see significant premium increases or changes - such as reduced coverage in the gap - if they stay in the same prescription drug plan in 2009. Medicare encourages individual beneficiaries to review how their plans are changing and what other options are available.

There are four ways to find out more information on Medicare as well as review and compare Part "D" plans: Call 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227, TTY 1-877-486-2048). 24 hour help is available from trained Medicare representatives. Visit <http://www.medicare.gov>. Compare costs, coverage and more. Get an estimate of your out-of-pocket costs for the year.

plan is designed to ensure a dependable source of water for LCRA's municipal and industrial water customers even during the worst drought on record.

The plan calls for the implementation of aggressive water conservation measures - the curtailment (or reduction) of water supplies to agriculture and customers other than cities and industry, reducing releases for environmental needs and implementing further water-use reduction measures for all customers under drought contingency plans when the amount of water in lakes Travis and Buchanan drops below certain levels, or "trigger points."

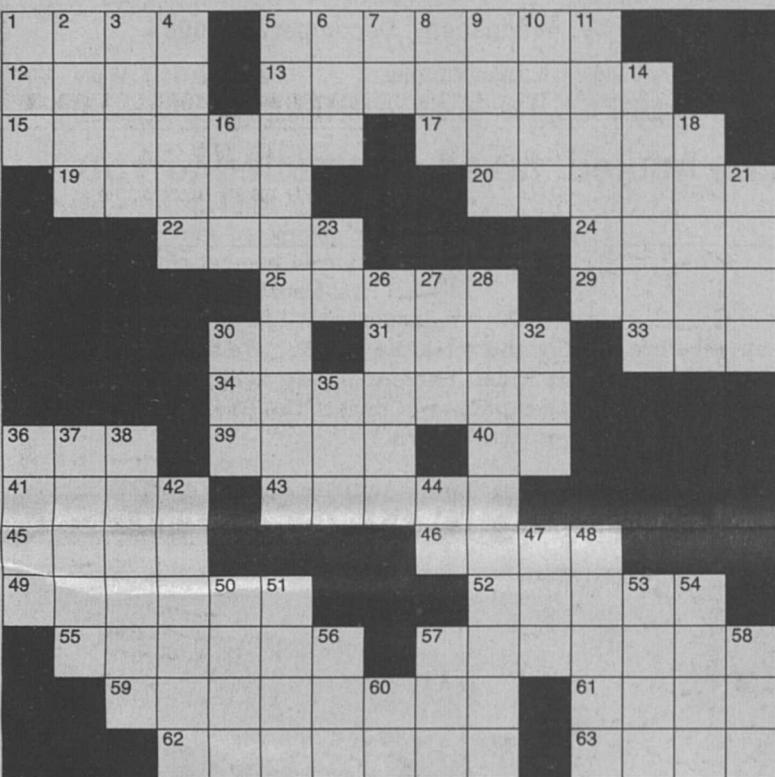
The latest projections indicate that the next "trigger point" will be reached on Jan. 1, 2009, causing LCRA to cut off supply to a small

group of interruptible customers and reduce the freshwater inflows to Matagorda Bay. According to the projections, LCRA will be able to provide a sufficient amount of water to rice farmers who rely on water from LCRA's irrigation divisions in the lower river basin.

We expect to begin releasing water for irrigation customers in March 2009. If weather patterns hold, we'll likely see much lower lake levels next year and the implementation of further curtailment measures.

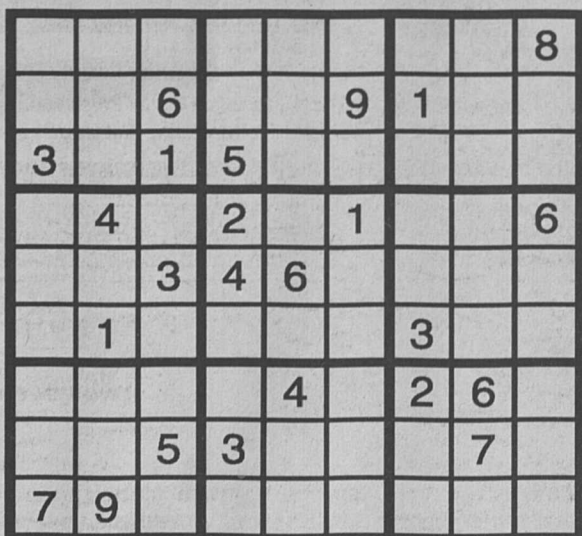
