She graduated with honors of Magna Cum Laude from Texas Southern University College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences on May 16.

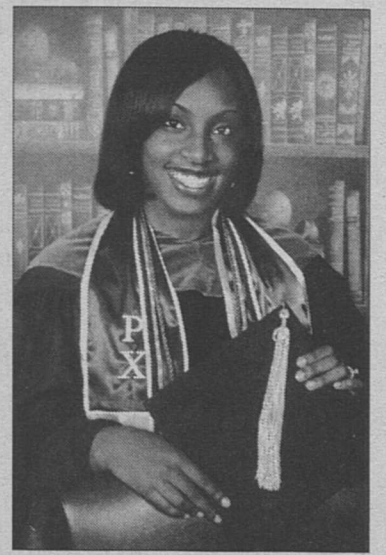

WCJC Students Attend Regional Conference

Students enrolled in the Human Services Program of Wharton County Junior College were from one of eight colleges invited to participate in a regional conference stemming from the Western Regional Organization of Human Services Professional at Coleman College of the Health Sciences auditorium in Houston earlier this year.

The goal of the conference was to have students present their view of the future of Human Services.

Students selected and researched a topic and presented it with a power point presentation. The WCJC students entitled their presentation "Linking Individuals in Rural Communities".

The students identified and addressed the needs of specific rural populations such as children/adolescents, the elderly (who make up about 22 percent of the rural population in Texas), women and issues relative to a farming/rural community.

Students also expressed poten-

tial resolutions and mechanisms to empower individuals within rural communities by providing services relative to their needs.

The WCJC students delivered the only presentation pertinent to a rural community. According to WCJC Human Services Program Director Victoria Schultz the students from other colleges were very interested in meeting with the WCJC students to share information and knowledge unique to rural populations.

There were breakdown sessions designed to discuss issues pertinent to the current and future status of Human Services as a field as well as program implementation processes and networking of resources and services.

Students gained a better understanding of the provision of services, the necessity of resource networking and the need of modification of project/programs in order to meet the changing needs of the service populations.

April Egg Production Up Slightly On Year

April 2009 egg production in Texas totaled 397 million eggs, up slightly from April 2008 but down 4 percent from March 2009, according to the monthly report released by the Texas Field Office.

The number of layers during April averaged 18.2 million, down 2 percent from last year and down 1 percent from March 2009.

Egg production per 100 layers averaged 2,183 eggs, up 3 percent from last year but down 4 percent from last month.

Texas hatchery production of broiler-type chicks totaled 55.9 million, up slightly from last year.

United States egg production totaled 7.46 billion eggs during April 2009, up 1 percent from a year ago.

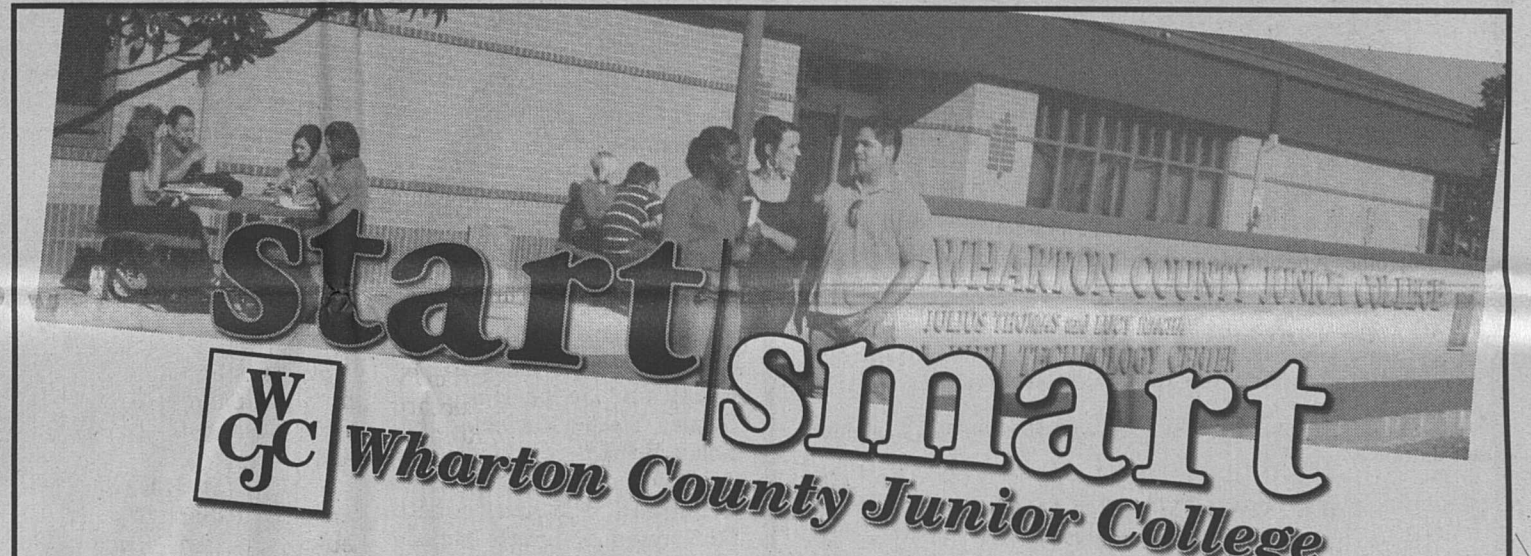
Production included 6.41 billion table eggs, 980 million broiler-type hatching eggs and 71 million egg-type hatching eggs.

Nationally, the total number of layers averaged 340 million during April 2009, down slightly from a year ago. Production per 100 layers was 2,196 eggs, up 2 percent from April 2008.

The U.S. monthly hatch of egg-type chicks totaled 40.6 million, down 4 percent from April 2008.

The hatch of broiler-type chicks, at 756 million, was down 6 percent from April of last year.

The leading U.S. breeders placed 6.16 million broiler-type pullet chicks for future domestic hatchery supply flocks during April 2009, down 13 percent from April 2008.

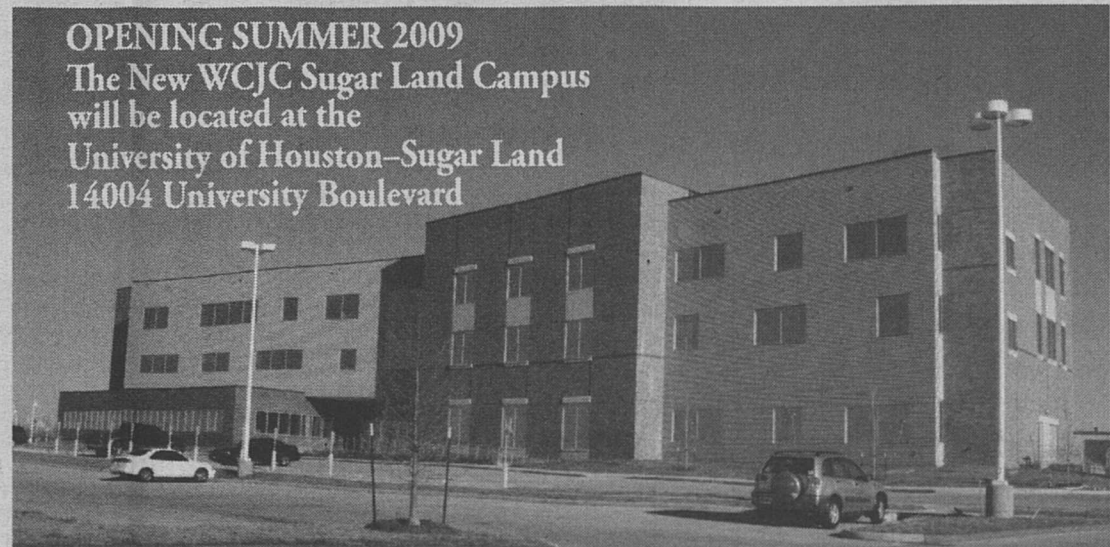
