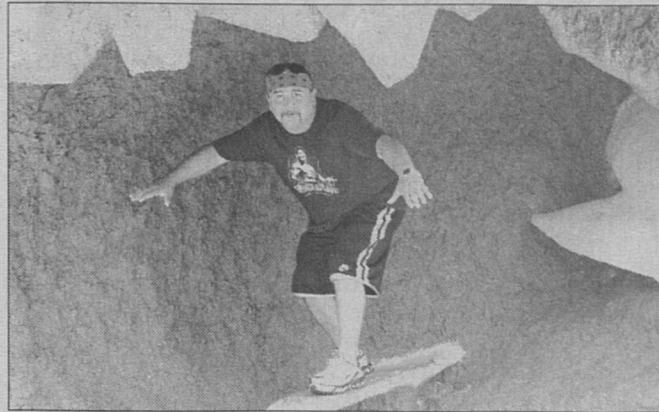
And for those with even more action in mind, there will be a horseshoe tournament beginning at 2 p.m. and a soccer tournament throughout the day.

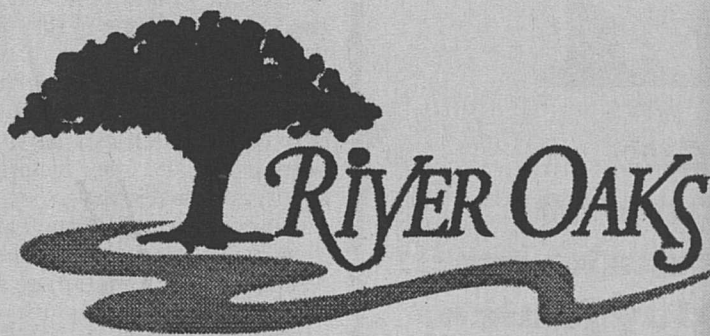
