Too much of anything is not good for you and toothpaste is no exception. The flouride that is in toothpaste is a proven benefit in tooth protection. It helps prevent tooth decay by making the enamel outer portion of the tooth more resistant to attack by acid. It's so helpful that for more than four decades the American Dental Association has endorsed the fluoridation of public water supplies and the use of products that contain fluoride as safe and effective

measures for preventing tooth decay. Too much fluoride, though, can lead to fluorosis, which causes permanent tooth discoloration. Children are particularly at risk from ingesting fluoride that's meant for topical use only. So be careful with young children learning to brush their teeth. Parents should limit them to a small dab of toothpaste and teach them to spit out the paste, not swallow it. Don't forget that fluoride occurs naturally in brewed tea, canned fish, cooked kale and spinach, apples and skim milk.

You should talk to your dentist for advice on how much fluoride you or your children ingest.

Universally designed rooms feature elements such as dropped countertops, grab bars, level door handles, step-less entryways, wide hallways and curbless showers for safety and accessibility.
