Colorado County Groundwater District News

It was in my Junior High School days, back when the new fad was 8-track tape players and telephones still used a rotary dial that I first learned about the hydrologic cycle.

Well, most people probably think about the hydrologic cycle about as often as they think of 8-track players.

I can't blame anyone for not remembering.

In fact, if I didn't have a degree in Geology and they expected me to remember that sort of thing, then I probably wouldn't recall it either.

So, to those of you who need a refresher on the subject, here it is.

Water evaporates into the air where it condenses and eventually falls back to the ground as precipitation.

That water either flows into streams and rivers or it soaks into the ground.

In the ground, plants might take it up or it may infiltrate into the aquifer where it will begin to flow through the subsurface strata.

While in the aquifer, the water might be pumped out by a well or it might continue to flow toward a creek or stream or even find its way back into the Gulf.

Eventually, the water finds its way back to the surface where evaporation takes place and the whole 'cycle' begins anew.

So, there you go.

Part of a Junior High Science curriculum in one simple paragraph.

But, why is this important to know?

One of the key objectives of the Colorado County Groundwater Conservation District is to interpret how much groundwater we have available to us.

Virtually everything I mentioned in the paragraph above needs to be measured in some fashion in order to determine groundwater availability.

So, let's recap.

All we need to know is how much groundwater is: flowing into or out of rivers and streams; flowing into and out of the district boundaries; produced from spring flow; and, pumped out of the ground by wells.

No problem.

Of course, we also need to know: how much precipitation is recharging the aquifer; how much is being taken up by plants; and how much is being lost to evaporation.

No sweat.

But, just in case you do, we'll probably need to know how much sweat you produce too.

You may have gleaned from the above that we are somewhat past the Junior High level of the hydrologic cycle.

In fact, even a geologist with an advanced degree, cannot easily figure out from this data how much groundwater we have available to us.

That's why the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) has developed sophisticated computer models that can simulate this movement of water.

There is one thing to remember though.

Even if you're a top chef, you're not going to make a tasty meal if you're missing some key ingredients or worse, if some of the ingredients are rotten.

Similarly, the results the model spits out are only as good as the data that goes into it.

As it stands now, the TWDB only monitors a handful of wells in Colorado County.

From so few wells, can we expect the model to be accurate?

If instead of a few wells, however, the district could supply water level data from dozens of wells, then the confidence in the model results would be appreciably higher.

You'd have to feel good that the recipe is sound and the meal will taste delicious.

Okay, enough with the cooking metaphors.

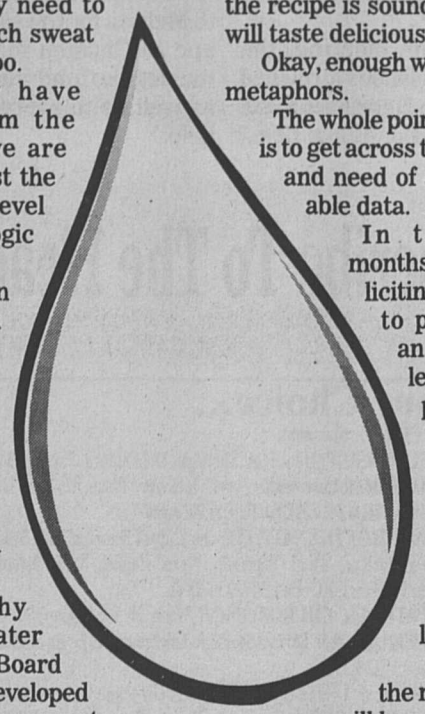
The whole point of this article is to get across the importance and need of acquiring reliable data.

In the coming months, we will be soliciting well owners to participate in an ongoing water level monitoring program.

The District would visit your well and take periodic measurements of the water level.

Over time, the measurements will become invaluable data points in the TWDB computer simulation model.

Then, you can proudly announce to your friends and family that not only do you understand the hydrologic cycle, you've had a hand in conquering it!
