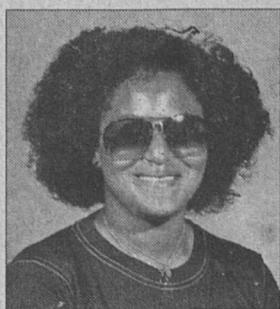

Funeral services for James Curtis Crabb, age 73, were held on Monday, May 3, at 11 a.m. in the Robb Chapel at The Woodlands United Methodist Church with Dr. Mark Lewis and Pastor Rob Renfro officiating.
Interment will follow in Garden Park Cemetery.
Visitation was scheduled for Sunday, May 2, from 1-4 p.m., at Cashner Funeral Home in Conroe.
James was born July 24, 1936 in Sweeney, to James Mercer and Lottie Belle Crabb and passed away on April 27, in Fullerton, California due to complications during heart surgery.
He was a graduate of Sam Houston State University where he was a member of Kappa Kappa Psi, Kappa Delta Pi, Alpha Chi and the Sam Houston Bearkat Marching Band.
James taught band for 12 years at East Bernard High School, Willis High School and Sealy High School. He was a counselor at

Rice High School, Eagle Lake, for two years.

Historical Commission Grant Applications Being Accepted

The Texas Historical Commission (THC) is accepting applications for the Texas Preservation Trust Fund (TPTF) Grant Program for fiscal year 2010.

The submission phase is a two-step process, first requiring a brief application form which is reviewed by the THC.

The deadline to submit an initial application is June 11, 2010. Highest priority projects will be invited to proceed by submitting detailed project proposals by the fall.

Final grant awards will be decided in January 2011.

TPTF grants help save and protect Texas' threatened historic structures and significant archeological sites.

Grant awards can be used by communities for restoration work, architectural planning, archeological investigation, preservation planning, curatorial services, resource survey and heritage

educational training.

Some past grant awards have funded stabilization and architectural improvements at the Grand Theatre in Wichita County, archeological work at Presidio La Bahia in Goliad County and architectural planning at the Houston Fire Museum in Harris County.

Created by the Texas Legislature in 1989, the TPTF Grant Program is an interest-earning pool of public and private monies. Competitive grants are awarded on a one-to-one match basis and are paid as reimbursement for eligible expenses incurred during the project.

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Treatment for this Lung Infection

Bronchiolitis, a type of respiratory tract infection, is a common condition in children less than 2 years of age. The condition is commonly caused by a virus, but may also be caused by bacteria. Respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) is the most common cause of bronchiolitis in young children. Infection from this virus leads to inflammation of the small airways (called bronchioles). Symptoms of bronchiolitis include runny nose, fever, cough, and wheezing. Symptoms generally last about one to one and a half weeks. Most episodes are mild and resolve on their own.

Inhaled drugs called bronchodilators are often prescribed in some children with bronchiolitis. Albuterol (*Proventil*, *Ventolin*) and salmeterol (*Serevent*) are bronchodilators. Glucocorticoids (*prednisone*, *prednisolone*) may be prescribed, however are not routinely done so for this purpose. Palivizumab (*Synagis*) is an RSV-specific humanized monoclonal antibody that may be used for prevention of RSV in infants at high risk for complications from RSV infection. Palivizumab is administered by an injection during the months when RSV is most common, typically during the winter months. Annual immunization with influenza vaccine is also recommended for children 6 months to 18 years, and household contacts of children up to 59 months old.
