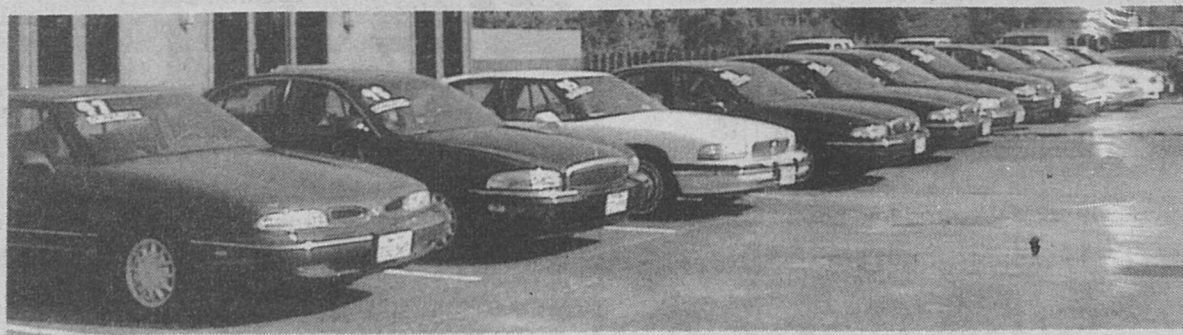

riage house and the privy which is now used for storage.

As with all historical sites, repairs to the property are done carefully to retain the originality. A picket fence in the back yard was recently repaired using the original pickets.

The Legation offers a variety of interesting historical programs by appointment for classes of elementary, middle and secondary school students. An interesting program demonstrated to the DRT was the hands-on "Dig in a Box" during which the students are allowed to "dig" for archaeological items placed there for them to "find". Visiting student groups may be as large as 50, requiring one chaperone for each 10 students.

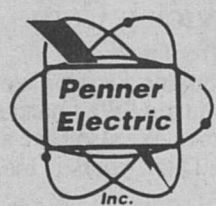

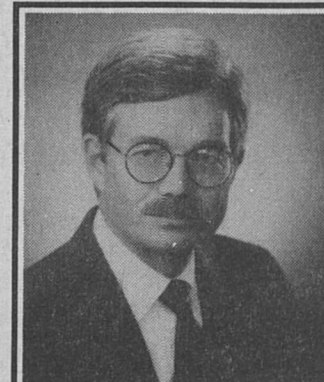

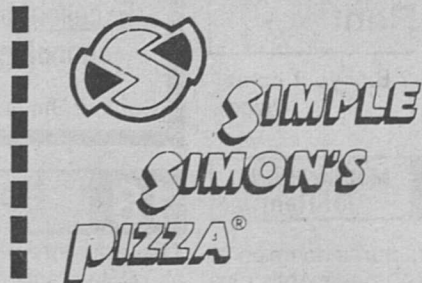
