Twenty-Two New State Laws To Take Effect On January 1

AUSTIN -- The 80th Texas search Center Legislature last spring passed 22 pieces of legislation enacting state laws to take effect Jan. 1.

HB 481 by Rep. Jim Jackson, R-Carrollton, amends the Transportation Code to allow the seller of a used vehicle to report the sale to TxDOT through the agency's Web site within 30 days, in lieu of filing a written and signed transfer notice. The bill also increases the penalty for the buyer of a used car that did not transfer the title within the 20 business-day grace period.

* HB 538 by Rep. Bill Callegari, R-Katy, amends the Tax Code to allow a property owner to postpone their appraisal protest one time without showing cause, and increasing the postponement period from 15 to 30 days.

HB 1751 by Rep. Ellen Cohen, D-Houston, amends the **Business and Commerce Code** and Government Code by imposing a fee of \$5 on a sexually oriented business providing live nude entertainment. Up to \$25 million in money generated by the fee, per fiscal biennium, goes to the state's sexual assault program fund. The amount of money received from the fee in excess

* HB 3495 by Rep. John Otto, tration transfer with the person R-Dayton, amends the Tax Code regarding the notice of an open meeting at which a governing body of a taxing unit will vote on a tax increase.

> The notice now must include: -Dates on which the first and second public hearings on the proposed tax increase were held;

- Total tax revenue raised at last year's tax rate;

-Amount of total tax revenue proposed to be raised excluding tax revenue to be raised from new property added to the tax roll;

-Amount of total tax revenue proposed to be raised including the tax revenue to be raised from new property added to the tax roll;

-The proposed tax rate; and -The mailing address of the location where the meeting to vote on the tax rate will be held.

Never Too Late To Improve Your Health

message for the elderly: It's not too late to improve your health through diet and exercise, even if you've had an unhealthy lifestyle in the past.

Published in the "American Journal of Clinical Nutrition," the report found that adult aged 65 and older can have significant health improvements with simple and realistic lifestyle changes.

The study found that risk can be reduced for many diseases -- including obesity, cancer, cardiovascular disease and osteoporosis.

"I think this is an extremely important and positive message. Many elderly people feel that it is too late for them to improve their health, but that is simply not true," said the paper's lead symposium editor, Dr. Richard S. Rivlin, professor of medicine at Weill Cornell Medical College and attending physician at NewYork-Presbyterian/Weill Cornell.

Dr. Rivlin analyzed how the elderly can ward off risks to their health late in life by improving body composition -- lowering fat and boosting muscle mass.

Adhering to a low-calorie and low-fat diet high in vegetables and fruits - combined with a regular exercise plan -- can help the elderly stave off the diseases

Lowering high blood pressure or hypertension -- a major risk for cardiovascular disease -- through improved diet and exercise had more dramatic health benefits for the elderly than for any other age group. Control of hypertension could potentially prevent one-fifth of coronary heart disease cases in men, and 30 percent in women.

Older adults who adhered to a low-calorie diet with regular exercise had lower rates of cancer. In one study, risk was reduced by nearly 50 percent.

Benefits of weight training include increased ability to burn calories and prevention of osteo-

Calcium and vitamin D supplements for seniors helped slow rates of bone loss and reduce the number of bone fractures.

"Our study reviews and presents the most up-to-date information showing the influence a healthy lifestyle may have on cardiovascular disease, cancer and osteoporosis," said Dr. Rivlin. "I also believe that the risk for other diseases, like diabetes and pulmonary disease, can also be avoided 'When measures to combat through later intervention. But,
