A Hockley man was shot to death on Wednesday, Dec. 30, at a residence at 1123 FM 532 in the New Bielau area, and his nephew

was charged with murder in the

Slain was Don Ulbricht, 49. He was rushed to Colorado-Fayette Medical Center by Emergency Medical Service ambulance, but was pronounced dead at the hospital.

His nephew Francis Madison Johnson, 27, of Weimar, was charged with murder

His bond was originally set at \$1 million by Peace Justice Bill Hefner and was later reduced to \$150,000 by District Judge W.C. (Bud) Kirkendall.

He surrendered at the scene of the shooting, without incident, according to Sheriff's Lt. Troy

Deputies responded to a 9-1-1 call about a shooting at 7:20 p.m., Neisner said.

He said that Ulbrict had been shot in the chest and had more than one gunshot wound, but said the exact number of wounds would be determined by an autopsy to be performed by the Travis County Medical Examiner's Office. That autopsy was ordered by Peace

Justice Francis Truchard. A SKS assault rife was recovered at the scene, Neisner said. He said Johnson had given

The 918 total includes 248 felonies, 599 county court misdemeanors (including 61 hot check cases), 48 juvenile cases, 17 bond forfeitures, and 6 asset forfeitures. The total does not include unsolved cases, cases not filed due to insufficient evidence, motions filed to revoke probation or adjudicate guilt, children's protective services cases, assaultfamily violence protective orders, or cases filed in the justice of the

Merchants submitted hot checks worth \$82,218.91 to the County Attorney's office in 2009, compared to \$135,902.48 in 2008. This lower amount reflects the increasing use of debit cards and the decision by Wal-Mart's corporate office to use private collection companies for all their stores. The estimated total value for this year is \$1.659 billion, according to figures from the Colorado County Appraisal District. The decrease is the first in a number of years in the county. Last year property values increased by 6.9 percent. Most of the decrease was in oil and gas property values. Those decreased by 13.7 percent or \$47.8
