BONUS PLANTATION SOLD OUT.

The large Bonus plantation, owned by Mr. W. T. Eldridge, was sold to the Lincoln Trust company Wednesday. The tracts known as the Bonus, Hearn, Lee Hughes and McDow farms were included, making a total acreage of about 9000. The price paid for the entire interest of Mr. Eldridge in these places amounted to something over \$250,000.00. This was one of the largest plantation transactions probably known to have taken place in this section in history of land sales.

This plantation is known as a small town in itself. It employs hundreds of men, only fifty of which are state convicts, who live there and spend their money, making the mercantile business flush and good.

There has been nothing definite learned as to the changes in the management, or rather the operators now employed, but the general supposition is that, for the present, the new owners will make very few changes, at least we hope to see our friends continue straight through.
